# Course description:

In this seminar we will reconsider the standard early modern canon in two different ways. First, we will examine feminist critiques of canonical figures in early modern philosophy, and also responses to those critiques. This may also involve looking at some of the ways in which early modern philosophers might have presaged later feminist thought in their work. Second, we will consider whether the canon might be limited and limiting: we will look at some of the writings of early modern women philosophers to think about the ways in which their work might have contributed to significant philosophical debates in the period.

Prerequisite for undergraduates: eligibility for fourth-year standing in a Philosophy Honours program or permission of the Department.

## Required text (available at the Carleton bookstore):

Margaret Atherton, "Women Philosophers of the Early Modern Period" (Hackett 1994)

You can also purchase this volume online in a number of places, e.g., on amazon.ca.

We will also be consulting a variety of primary and secondary sources, most of which can be accessed through the Carleton library website. I will typically make such readings available on cuLearn by linking to the library's e-resources / through the Ares reserves system. When possible, I will also place texts on reserve in the library so that you can read them in hard copy, if this is your preference.

Many early modern texts are available online in a variety of locations. Note however that many such sources are abridged or otherwise altered. If you wish to consult an online source outside of Carleton's e-resources, you must discuss this with me, so that I can help you to evaluate whether or not the source is appropriate.

#### cuLearn:

#### **Evaluation**:

1. Response papers – over the course of the semester, I will ask you to write four (4) short response papers of 1-2 pages (double-spaced) each. These response papers will be due at the beginning of class and should be on the topic of the <u>previous</u> week's reading / class discussion. I will be asking you to read these response papers in class; you should be prepared to briefly discuss them, as well.

Note: You must write / submit at least one (1) of your response papers in the first half of the semester, that is, by October 19, 2015 at the latest. You will only be graded on three (3) response papers after this date has passed.

Response papers should be submitted on cuLearn. You may also submit a hard copy if you like. Each response paper will be worth **10%** of your final grade for a total of **40%**.

### What is a response paper?

Response papers should involve a brief reconstruction or summary of at least one aspect of the previous week's reading, as well as (the following list is not exclusive):

- A clarification of a difficult issue addressed in the reading, or
- A question raised by the previous week's reading, along with the author's answer to that question, or your answer on behalf of the author, or
- An objection to the previous week's reading, along with the author's answer to the objection, or your answer on behalf of the author, or
- An issue addressed by the author that was not raised in the previous class discussion, and that you think ought to be addressed
- **2. Final take-home exam** a mid-length paper (**8-10 pages**) on a topic of your choosing, due on the last day of exam period for the Fall 2015 Semester (**December 21**<sup>st</sup>.) You must consult with me on your topic at least two weeks before the end of classes. Topics *must be approved*.

Final papers should be submitted on cuLearn and will be worth 60% of your final grade.

**Late papers:** I will not accept response papers late, as we will be discussing them in class. Additionally, no extensions will be granted for final take-home papers, as it is university policy that the last day for handing in take-homes is the last day of exam period (in this case, December 21<sup>st</sup>, 201
