Course Description

Having in Mind

What does it mean to have someone/thing in mind? To entertain a *de re* (singular) thought? Does language (e.g. proper names) allow us to entertain de singular thought? Does one need to be acquainted with an individual to have it in mind? What does acquaintance amount to? To deal with these and related questions we'll start by focusing on the work of Russell (in particular his distinction between knowledge by acquaintance vs. knowledge by description) and Donnellan's developments.
