Spinoza's Political Philosophy

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Course Description:

In this seminar, we will acquaint ourselves with Spinoza's political philosophy through the study of his two major works: the *Ethics* and the *Theological-Political Treatise (TTP)*. The *TTP* was widely condemned after its publication for the revolutionary positions it argued for on such issues as: freedom of thought, expression, and worship; the proper relation between secular and sacred authorities; the relation between right and power; the nature, origins, and rightful limits of State-power; the nature of God, miracles, providence, and salvation; the authorship and status of the Hebrew Bible; and so on. The *Ethics*, is, as one would assume from its title, primarily a work of ethics. And yet, as such, for reasons we will have to delve into, it has quite a bit to say on the kinds of issues listed above. It also, as such, systematically demonstrates many of the propositions and principles of metaphysics, epistemology, ethics and moral psychology that are more or less taken for granted by the *TTP*. Thus, while our primary aim will be to understand Spinoza's political thought as it is expressed in the *TTP*, it will be useful, with this aim in mind, to engage in a preliminary reading of the *Ethics*.

Grades for this course will be based on:

- (1) class participation, including one short class presentation, worth 25% of the final grade;
- (2) one annotated bibliography with 15 entries, due on the last day of class, worth 25% of the final grade;
- (3) one 15 to 20 page paper, due on the last day of the December examination period, and worth 50% of the final grade.

Required Texts:

Spinoza's *Ethics* and *Theological-Political Treatise*.

Any edition of these works will do, although I would recommend avoiding all translations by R.H.M. Elwes.
