

PHIL1301C: Mind, World, and Knowledge

Course description: This course examines different theories of mind. We will explore dualism, monism, and related theories of mind and how humans acquire knowledge of the world around us. We will look at theories in philosophy of mind and philosophy of cognitive science, and how contemporary philosophers address the longstanding and pressing questions concerning mind and body/brain interaction.

Course aim: The aim of this course is to teach students about some of the basic writings in philosophy of mind. At the end of this course, students will have a firm grasp of the fundamental issues in philosophy of mind and the theories that address these issues.

Grading: You will be graded on a midterm exam, one short paper (approx. 4-6 pages, double space), and one final exam. Grading: (1) Midterm: 30%, (2) Paper: 30% (3) Final exam: 40%.

Dos and Don'ts: Do complete the readings, come to class, and complete your assignments on time. Questions on the exams will not be based solely off of the readings, so class attendance is important if you want to succeed in this course. If you are having difficulties, including difficulties completing an assignment on time, talk to me during my office hours. Do not use your laptops in class unless special permission has been granted. Do not use your cell phone, iPhone, or Android during class. Do not be disruptive during class.

Submission policy: Submit your essay in class ON or BEFORE the due date. Late penalties are 5 points per calendar day late (i.e. 5% of your final assignment grade) *unless* you have reached a prior agreement with me. Points may also be detracted for grammar and spelling errors.

Assignments:

Unless specifically told otherwise by their instructors, students:
