**Course Description:**

This is an introduction to the ethical and social issues that arise in medicine, public health, biotechnology and health care. We start with the ethical theories and philosophical principles that provide a framework for bioethics debates.

Topics will include medical research on humans and animals, abortion, reproductive ethics, cloning, doctor-patient relationships, informed consent, euthanasia and doctor assisted suicide, transplants, genetic engineering, and public health care.

**Learning Objectives:**

As a course in Philosophy, one of the objectives is to give you the knowledge to understand the issues, problems and arguments that arise in Bioethics.

A second objective is to give you the practical reasoning skills, to enable you to deal with all the issues and problems discussed, and to increase sensitivity to Bioethical issues.

The third objective, since this is Applied Ethics, is to deal with the currency and relevance of Bioethical issues, as they impact on life.

## **Grading and Evaluation:**

- (a) There is one test scheduled during class time, during the term, worth 20% of your grade.

- (b) There will be a final exam, worth 50% of your grade, during the exam period - date, time and place to be determined by Exam Scheduling.

- (d) You will write a term paper, worth 20% of your grade, description and due date to be discussed in class.

### Assignments:

Unless specifically told otherwise by their instructors, students:
