Course Description

This course examines two areas of personal identity in philosophy. The first part of this course explores personal identity and examines different theories of what a 'self' consists of. We will look at the ethical and moral responsibilities bound with different conceptions of personal identity. The second part of this course will focus on the philosophy of mind and mental illness, and the role that personal identity plays in mental disorders.
