Emotional Congruence with Children (ECWC)

Finkelhor (1984)

- *Emotional congruence* a nonsexual motivation for the initiation of sexual offending behaviour
- A relationship between offender and child due, in part, to a perceived fit between the offender's emotional needs and the child's characteristics
 - perceived fit due to child-like self-image; low self-efficacy/self-esteem; past abuse history
 - emotional needs are expressed as desire to relate to children, to have companionship/love, or to work out childhood issues
- Children are a source of emotional gratification for individual

Emotional Congruence with Children (ECWC)

Fixated Type (Groth et al., 1982)

- Identify with children & experience self as a child
- Psychologically immature
- Social attraction to children

Interpersonal Type (Knight & Prentky, 1990)

- Large amount of time spent with children
- Seek interpersonal, friend-type relationships with children

Empirical Trends

- “High Deviance” = High ECWC
- Predictive of Sexual Recidivism

Implicit Cognition & ECWC

- Assessing implicit cognitions: Implicit Association Test (Greenwald, McGhee, & Schwartz, 1998)
- Extending empirical understanding beyond self-report
- Existent IAT research with sex offenders against children
- Implicit emotional congruence with children?

Current Study

- Two IATs and self-report measures used to assess implicit and explicit emotional congruence with children
- Assess strength of convergent validity between measures

Method

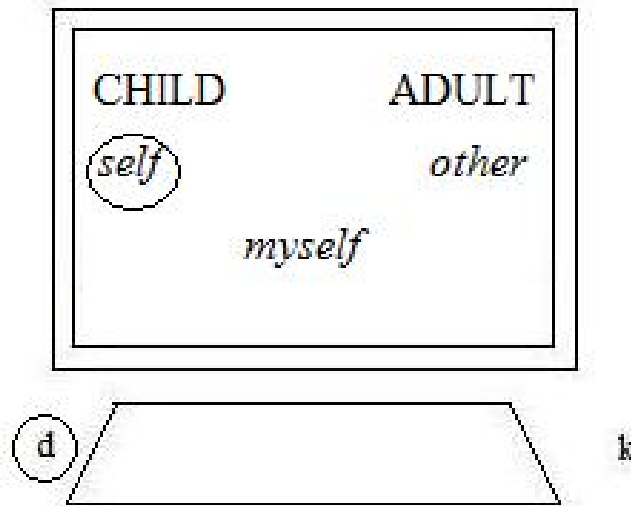
Participants

- Sexual Offenders against Children (SOC)
 - 13 extrafamilial SOC; 8 intrafamilial SOC
 - inclusion criteria: one victim 13 years of age or younger; relationship to victim
- Non-sex Offenders (NSO) & Sexual Offenders against Adults (SOA)
 - 17 NSO; 9 SOA
 - inclusion criterion: no prior/index convictions for or self-reported sexual offenses against victims less than 16 years of age
- Student Controls
 - 54 male Carleton University psychology students
- Sampling Sources: forensic psychiatric hospital, federal correctional institutions, and Carleton University

Method

Measures

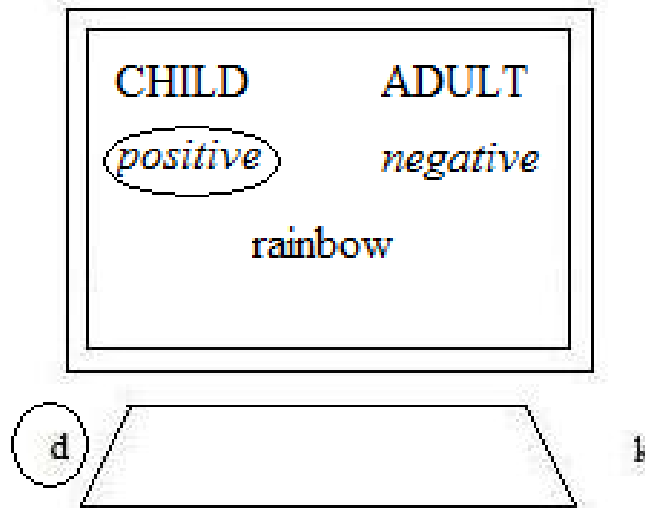
- Child Identification IAT
 - Stimuli Used: Words; Images of adult and child male faces



Method

Measures

- Child Evaluation IAT
 - Stimuli Used: Words; Images of adult and child female and male faces



Method

Measures

- Children and Sex Questionnaire's Emotional Congruence with Children Scale (CSQ:ECWC; Beckett, 1987)
 - Factors: Positive Affect from Children, Special Relationship with Children, and Preference for Relationships with Children (Waldron et al., 2006)

- Child Identification Scale-Revised (CIS-R; Wilson, 1999)
 - Factors: Start Life Over, Immaturity, Mentoring, Loner, Enjoys Children's Activities, Longing for Childhood, Empathy for Children, Abused as a Child
