"she took a tough attitude toward other people's indulgences"




- "Degree to which a person has a favorable or unfavorable evaluation or appraisal of the behavior" (Ajzen, 1991)
- Attitudes = evaluations






















Abstract
The purpose of the current study was to explore whether measures such as the Violence Scale of the Revised Measures of Criminal Attitudes and Associates (MCAA-R-V) and the Criminal Attitudes to Violence Scale (CAVS) assess attitudes toward violence (i.e., evaluation of Violence) and whether attitudes and the Cognitions assessed by the MCAA-R-V and the CAVS are independently associated with violent behavior. 
Abstract

Attitude-Change Condition


• Violence is a "lose-lose" situation, with negative consequences for everyone involved.
