Central to our era is the idea that people should be committed to the movement of all the world's regions toward a uniform standard of social and economic development; hence, policymakers, economists, politicians, and academics will speak of developed, developing, and underdeveloped nations and regions. In this class we will read literary works and watch films exploring the contexts in which ideals of development became prominent; the effects of development policy on societies and individuals; prominent critiques of development; and the onset of what some have called the era of de-development. We will seek to understand different motives and voices that have been engaged in producing accounts of *how*, *why*, and *toward what end* peoples, cultures, and societies develop. We will also consider the uniquely artistic and literary techniques and strategies devised by writers and filmmakers to engage with the development age and dominant development ethos.

 - o submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
 - o using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
 - o using another's data or research findings;
 - o failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
 - handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs.
 - Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They may include a mark of zero for the plagiarized work or a final grade of "F" for the course.
