SOCI 2180/ANTH 2180: Foundations of Community Engagement Fall 2021

Have you ever been part of a community – or wanted to be an ally to a community – which needed a voice in creating change? Community engagement is a process by which communities can achieve common goals, organizations can ensure they are meeting their constituency needs, businesses can work to align with community values, and governments can engage citizens on proposed policies and laws.

This course aims to introduce you to the power of community engagement while giving you an understanding of the limitations. Community engagement can support marginalized communities by, for example, identifying a need for a physical space to be more accessible. It can also, if not done carefully, reinforce existing hierarchies of power by excluding groups such as racialized individuals and communities if their experiences are not represented. Creating an inclusive environment is a complex undertaking; this will be a focus of our course.

We will work online with a community organization to support their community engagement activities. As we do so, we will analyse processes involved in inclusive and successful engagement and learn firsthand the satisfaction of doing this work.

The class will meet on Zoom each week. A stable internet connection and webcam is required.
