COURSE DESCRIPTION / INSTRUCTOR'S STATEMENT

The course examines dynamic relations in the interplay between drivers, agency, material and ideological boundaries and territories. We study the state's role and international conventions that regulate migration and distinguish between refugees, people seeking temporary international protection, seasonal or temporary workers, permanent migrants and diasporas through the policy categories.

Analyzing mobility and nation-building, we explore the relationship between migration, transnational actors (diasporas) and multiple global and national agencies in Canada and globally.

The course will be delivered **online** through a combination of lectures and seminars, prompting students to critically engage with questions surrounding borders, migration, and citizenship. These questions include inquiries into the forces driving human migration, the perspectives of various stakeholders on human mobility, the impact of migration regulations on migrants, and the unique features of the Canadian migration regime.
