

Colonialism and Everyday Life in Quebec: Images as Stories



How can we acknowledge and tackle the effectivity of colonialism in daily life? Colonialism is the situation we are immersed in—its culture is the realm of the repeated, the un-noticed, the ingrained, the fleeting, the actual. Assembling images from family archives, rumors, vernacular art, media reels and literature, Dalie Giroux will explore the predicament of culture as colonial culture in Quebec. The bottom line: a notion of mastery, a fantasy of power, a whole aesthetics of hierarchy.

Report on SICS January Research Talks

SICS concluded its January activities with a panel in our Research Talks series which focused on "Place and Meaning in Settler Colonial Ontario". The talks were moderated by SICS instructor Dr. Orly Lael Netzer, who also provided the summary below:

- SSHRC Postdoctoral Fellow Mark Currie (left in image below), shared his work on racism in small-town Ontario. Exploring how research participants recognize and remember racism in their hometown, Dr. Currie posited that small-town communities in Ontario demonstrate a mode of "selective antiracism".
- Professor Jennifer Henderson (right in image below) introduced SICS to her
 collaborative project which seeks to disrupt the erasure of colonial legacies on the
 Oblates Land in Ottawa using creative-critical practices. Thinking about the
 redevelopment of the The Deschâtelets monastery land, and its implication as an
 administrative centre of many schools in the IRS system, Professor Henderson
 speaks of Ottawa as a site of collective amnesia pedagogy.

The lively discussion attended to questions of difficult and contested heritage, as well as the politics of self-positioning among and within settler communities.

Heritage Ottawa lecture by SICS MA student

THINKING OUTSIDE THE "STRAWBERRY" BOX: EXPLORING NEW HERITAGE CONSERVATION TOOLS IN CARLINGTON

On January 18, Greg MacPherson, who is completing a Master of Arts in Canadian Studies with a focus on heritage conservation while working as a Heritage Planner with the City of Ottawa, spoke about a neighbourhood in Ottawa's West end that was built for returning veterans and their families after the Second World War. The neighbourhood in Carlington North has recently been designated as a Veteran's Housing Character Area by the City of Ottawa. While Avery Marshall, the City's Heritage Register Coordinator, provided background on how Veteran Housing Communities came to be built in Canada at a time of considerable need, Greg explained how a Heritage Character Area was developed and applied to this neighbourhood that has managed to remain intact in the face of development pressures.
