Student Learning Outcomes:

At the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Understand and solve basic problems in friction.
- Understand and solve problems in wedges, threads, clutches and belt friction.
- Apply the principle of virtual work and potential energy in solving problems in statics.
- Understand and solve problems in kinematics of rigid bodies in two dimensions.

• Understand and solve problems in kinetics of rigid bodies in two dimensions.

Marking Scheme:

Mid-term Exam (35%): Closed book. A formula sheet will be provided in the exam. All topics covered until the end of the week before the exam will be included. Missing mid-term exam will automatically result in a mark of zero for that component unless acceptable documentation is presented to justify your absence within three days of the date of the mid-term exam. The instructor will decide what documentations are acceptable. You must obtain approval prior to the mid-term exam if you cannot write the mid-term exam at the scheduled time (except in cases of unexpected emergencies). If unsure of what would be proper documentation for the given circumstances, please consult with your instructor. If you miss the mid-term exam and present acceptable documentations, there will be only one make-up mid-term exam, time and place to be announced. *Tentative* Schedule: 16 February; Locations: the mid-term exam will be conducted during your PA session at your PA session class room.

Final Exam (65%): Maximum 3 hours. Date and time determined by the university. A minimum mark of 30% in term-work (Mid-term exam), 30% in the final exam, and 50% of the total mark (Mid-term exam + final exam) is required to pass this course.
