Trade is in the EU's DNA

- The EU is the largest economy in the world, with a GDP per capita of €25 000 for its 500 million citizens.
- The EU is the world's largest trader of manufactured goods and services.
- The EU ranks first in both inbound and outbound international investment.
- The EU is the top trading partner for 80 countries. By comparison the US is the top trading partner for a little over 20 countries.
- The EU is the most open to developing countries. Fuels excluded, the EU imports more from developing countries than the USA, Canada, Japan and China put together.





EU - Canada Trade






EU - Canada trade

- Canada is the EU's 10th biggest trading partner (1.8% of all goods exchanged)
- EU is Canada's 2nd biggest trading partner (10% of all goods exchanged)
- Total trade between Canada and the EU reached EUR 72.3 bn / C\$ 110.6 bn in 2018

CETA

- Removes 99% of tariffs on goods
- New market access from services to cheese
- Cheaper & easier to export: mutual recognition of testing, employee mobility
- Protects investments while enshrining the government's right to regulate
- Lower prices & more choice for consumers
- Respects the EU and Canada's high standards on labour, environment and consumer protection



Implementing CETA

- CETA signed 30 Oct 2016
- Provisionally applied as of 21 Sept 2017
- 2 years on: CAN exports +10%, EU +15%
- Working together to ensure widest possible takeup of opportunities (SMEs)
- Ongoing work on regulatory cooperation, mutual recognition of professional qualifications etc.




Trade in the classroom
