

Biographies

Tom Casier is Professor at the University of Groningen, where he holds the Chair in Global Politics of Europe. His research focuses mainly on Russian foreign policy, EU–Russia relations, and the EU and its eastern neighbours.

Joan DeBardeleben is Chancellor’s Professor in the Institute of European, Russian and Eurasian Studies at Carleton University and Co-Director of the Centre for European Studies. Her current research, based on a grant from Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada, is entitled *The European Union’s Eastern Policy and the Ukraine Crisis: Causes and Impacts*. She also conducts research on elections and regional politics in Russia. Dr. DeBardeleben is Editor-in-Chief of the *Canadian Journal of European and Russian Studies*, an online peer-reviewed open-access publication hosted by Carleton University.

Laure Delcour is Associate Professor at Sorbonne Nouvelle University (Paris, France) and Visiting Professor at the College of Europe (Bruges, Belgium). Her research interests focus on the diffusion and reception of EU norms and policies as part of the European Neighbourhood Policy, the interaction between European and Russian policies in Eastern Europe and the South Caucasus, as well as region-building processes in Eurasia. She has been involved as a coordinator or researcher in several EU-funded and French-funded research projects on these topics.

Magdalena Dembińska is Professor of Political Science, Université de Montréal. Her research in comparative politics focus on ethnic politics and conflict, state- and nation-building, nationalism and diversity, in the Eurasia and Central Europe. Author of two monographs, *Vivre ensemble dans la diversité. Développements en Europe centrale et orientale* (PUR 2012) and *La fabrique des États de facto* (PUM 2021), she currently conducts projects on patron-client-parent relations in Abkhazia and Transnistria as well as on Poland’s kin-state policies and Polish minorities in these de facto states and in Donbas.

Martin Geiger is Associate Professor of ‘Politics of Human Migration and Mobility’ at Carleton University. His work focuses on European and global migration governance, the role of inter-state and private actors in migration management, and interrelated aspects of political regulation, development (innovation and growth) and population change.

Paul Goode is Associate Professor and McMillan Chair of Russian Studies at the Institute of European, Russian and Eurasian Studies. His current research broadly focuses on nationalism and authoritarianism in Russia and the former Soviet states.

John Hicks is a Master’s student in political science at McGill University.

Achim Hurrelmann is Professor of Political Science at Carleton University. He is Co-Director of Carleton’s Centre for European Studies and coordinates the Jean Monnet Network on Transatlantic Trade Politics. His research focuses on the politics of the European Union, especially political discourses about European integration, the democratization of the EU, as well as Canada-EU relations.

Juliet Johnson is Professor in the Department of Political Science at McGill University. Her research focuses on the politics of money and identity, particularly in post-communist Europe.

William A. Kerr is Distinguished University Professor Emeritus at the University of Saskatchewan, Canada. His area of research is international agricultural trade. He has published 27 books and over 300 refereed journal articles. He is a Fellow of the Canadian Agricultural Economics Society.

Matúš Mišík is Associate Professor at the Department of Political Science at Comenius University Bratislava. His research interests include small states and energy security in the EU, he is the author of *External Energy Security in the European Union* (Routledge, 2019), co-author of *Energy Transitions in Central and Eastern Europe* (Cambridge University Press, 2024).

Ryhor Nizhnikau is a Senior Research Fellow in Russia, the EU's Eastern Neighbourhood and Eurasia programme at the Finnish Institute of International Affairs. He works on Russia's and the EU's policies towards Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia and Belarus, and studies the institutional transformations and political developments in the EU's Eastern neighbourhood.

Isaac Noveck is Research Assistant at the Centre for the Study of Democratic Citizenship's branch at McGill University.

Veronika Oravcová is Researcher at the Department of Political Science at Comenius University Bratislava and a research fellow at the Slovak Foreign Policy Association. Her research interests are centered on energy transition and energy security in Central and Eastern Europe. She has published several chapters on energy transition and papers on the Slovak and Visegrad energy policy.

Maria Popova is Associate Professor at McGill University and Scientific Director of the Jean Monnet Centre Montreal. She also serves as Editor of the Cambridge Elements Series on Politics and Society from Central Europe to Central Asia. Her work explores the rule of law and democracy in Eastern Europe.

David Sichinava is Adjunct Research Professor at the Institute of European, Russian and Eurasian Studies, Carleton University (Ottawa, Canada). His research focuses on the public opinion in post-Soviet Eurasia, the politics of urban development, and conflict-induced displacement in the South Caucasus. He is currently Associate Editor for the journal, *Communist and Post-Communist Studies*, published by the University of California Press.

Dietlind Stolle is James McGill Professor and Chair in Political Science at McGill University. Her research areas include Comparative Government and Politics.

Radka Vicenová is Researcher at the Slovak National Centre for Human Rights. Her research focuses primarily on the contemporary far right, particularly in Central and Eastern Europe.

Crina Viju-Miljusevic is Associate Professor and Director of the Institute of European, Russian and Eurasian Studies and Associate Director of the Centre for European Studies at Carleton University. She holds a Jean Monnet Chair in "EU External Relations: Competing Regionalism in Eurasia" funded by the Erasmus+ Programme of the European Union. Her research interests include the economic effects of trade policies applied within the EU, US and Canada, European economic integration, and the EU as an external actor. Her current research focuses on EU trade policy, Canada-EU Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) and EU, Russia and China as competing actors in Eurasia.

Ramūnas Vilpišauskas is the Konrad Adenauer Visiting Scholar on Transatlantic Relations at Carleton University for Fall 2024. He is Professor at the Institute of International Relations and Political Science of Vilnius University. In 2020-2023, he held a Jean Monnet Chair teaching, researching and debating EU related issues. In 2009-2019, he was a director of the Institute. In 2004-2009, he was a chief advisor on economic and social policy to the president of Lithuania Valdas Adamkus. His main research interests include public policy analysis and public sector reforms, political economy of European integration, global issues and transatlantic relations.
