## 2018 One Health Student Challenge Guidelines for Judges



The 2018 One Health Student Challenge was to “develop a framework for a designing a plan to ***mitigate the physical and mental health risks, and facilitate community rebuilding following a natural disaster, with a particular focus on First Nations communities in Canada’s northern regions.***”

On November 16, each of 5 teams has been tasked to

- 1) Have a display of their framework (e.g., infographic, poster, bulletin), and
- 2) Provide a 12-15 min (max) oral presentation to a panel of experts.

Following all of the presentations, judges will be able to visit with each team at their display, where they can ask any follow-up questions.

The judges are asked to rank each team’s framework or approach to the issue. The members of the winning team will be awarded a paid research internship under the supervision of a faculty researcher in their discipline.

Below are some criteria the judges can use to evaluate and rank the submissions.

Does the response to the challenge

- Examine the issue from one health perspective, incorporating the interplay among human, environmental, and animal health issues?
- Consider strategies for ensuring the engagement and leadership of communities in developing a solution?
- Demonstrate an understanding of the complexity of the issues?
- Clearly articulate critical risks, as well as assets and strengths that can be brought to the response?
- Demonstrate an understanding of the viewpoints of a range of key stake-holders affected by the problem?
- Provide a framework that is implementable given the range of cultural, social, political and economic realities?
- Include a plan for communicating the strategy and eliciting buy-in from the various stakeholders?
- Accurate, balanced, well-informed?
- Comprehensive with clear objectives?
- Creative, out-of-the-box, and compelling?
