Why Land Reform?

- FARC originally formed in response to land reform by gov't
 ultimately contributed to the conflict
- UN: "Land reform critical to lasting peace in Colombia"
- 7 million people forced from their land in the conflict
 87 000 land claims registered w gov't, over 179 000 hectares disputed land

Government Initiative (CRR): Four Steps

- 1. Creation of a land fund to identify and recover land
- 2. Mass formalization of small and medium rural properties (all lands to be formalized)
- 3. Establishment of an agrarian jurisdiction (court)
- 4. Creation and modernization of a multiple cadaster*

Our Plan

- promote and facilitate the land reform process through settling land claims; getting displaced Colombians back on their land
- WE ARE
 - collecting evidence
 - providing legal resources to claimants
 - training local Colombians to handle land disputes
 - collaborating with gov' to arbitrate cases
- WE ARE NOT
 - dealing with issues of security, demobilization
 - dealing with drug land use issues

Engaging Stakeholders

- National Land Agency Colombia
 - Special Land Unit within the Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development
 - NGO: The Forging Future Foundation
 - Local Colombians, Department Leaders

The Plan - Collecting Evidence

- Conduct outreach with local communities
- Meet with claimants, neighbours, other relevant stakeholders to collect additional information
- Creation and modernization of a cadaster linking the property registry with ownership of each parcel of land

The Plan - Legal Advice

- Seek the assistance of Canadian legal experts (ex. Prof Pam Palmater and Prof Brady Deaton)
- Experts will work on the ground providing advice to officials as well as be involved in training local Colombians involved in the program

The Plan - Arbitration

- Set up an arbitration process that is transparent and has local ownership
- A Canadian arbitrator working with local government officials to settle claims
- Train local arbitrators to handle land disputes

Resources Needed

- Translators
- Legal professionals
- Staff and researchers
- \$20 million dollars over a four year period
- Hire 20 Canadians and the rest of the staff should be Colombians

Measurability

- Currently there are 179,510 hectares of disputed territory, as we see that number go down, we can assess the efficacy of the program
- Measurability will also be determined by engaging with a local council which includes regional representatives, representatives of the 32 Colombian departments, and FARC leaders.
