This course surveys contemporary research and practices related to mental health and criminalization, including critical disability studies, the carceral management of persons deemed mentally ill, and the social uses of the concept of criminal responsibility.

Prerequisite(s): CRCJ 1000 and 3rd year standing in CCJ B.A. programs.

Methods used conducting qualitative research. Topics include field research, interviewing, ethnographic research, content analysis and ethics.

Prerequisite(s): CRCJ 1000 and third-year standing in the B.A program in Criminology and Criminal Justice.

CRCJ 3100A [0.5 credit]

Policing (in)Security

Theories and case studies addressing contemporary efforts to police the world of (in)securities. Emphasis on Canadian dynamics within these broader transformations.

Prerequisite(s): CRCJ 1000 and third-year standing in Criminology and Criminal Justice or by permission. Lecture and discussion three hours per week.
