#### **Student Award Funds: DEADLINE EXTENDED**

Are you working on a research paper that explores anti-racism or decolonization?

OR

Are you actively volunteering or working with a community project based on antiracist or decolonial objectives?

If so, consider applying for the ICCJs Research and Community Engagement Funds.

The ICCJ has established two sets of funds to support students committed to furthering their knowledge of, and to actively addressing structural racism and colonization. Each award has a value of \$1000.

## 1. Anti-racism and Decolonization Research Support Funds (2 awards to be granted)

ICCJ students working on research exploring anti-racism or decolonization may apply for a Support Fund. Examples of research include, but are not limited to:

- written ICCJ course papers (topics could include: race and the criminal justice system, Indigenous restorative justice, Black Lives Matter, criminalization of migration and the role of sanctuary cities).
- research undertaken with work, volunteer positions or the ICCJ placement program (possible examples include: researching BIPOC community resources for a non-profit agency, putting together info sheets or writing an anti-racism guide on diversity and advocacy)
- research conducted for your own interests or commitments, aspirational research plans for your future (possible examples include: a short write up on personal observations made from participating in BIPOC campus projects or a brief research plan for graduate studies)

## How to apply?

- Provide a 1-page (double spaced, 12pt. font, Times New Roman) letter explaining
  what you have learned as a Criminology student at the ICCJ, and how you intend to
  use this knowledge to engage in future research that explores an anti-racist or
  decolonial framework.
- Include a copy of research paper

#### 2. Community Engagement Support Fund (1 award to be granted)

ICCJ students working on anti-racism or decolonization issues in the community can apply for the Community Engagement Support Fund which includes, but not limited to students who:

- participate in community-based anti-racism initiatives or projects (possible examples include: volunteering to pass out flyers for BIPOC community talks or putting together an email list for a BIPOC grassroots collective)
- involved in anti-racism organizing or developing an anti-racism project possible examples include: (Taking a lead or supporting role in creating a BIPOC student group or planning a food share for BIPOC students and community members)
- participate in community-based projects that advance decolonial objectives or build Indigenous community networks (possible examples include: volunteering at the Minwaashin Lodge, or serving food at BIPOC gatherings or events)
- Pursuing studies with the goals of using your skills to advance community building and
  engagement projects with specific Indigenous communities (possible example could entail: a
  short-written piece on your plans to use your academic knowledge and skills to advance
  Indigenous interests and cultural continuity.

Please send a 1-page (double spaced, 12pt. font, Times New Roman) letter explaining your community engagement commitments and how it relates to your studies at the ICCJ.

- Tell us about your studies and your future plans;
- Outline any key experiences or motivations that inform your studies or future plans

# **Additional Support Fund Guidelines**

At the time of submission, the applicant must:

- Be a student registered in the B.A. program in Criminology and Criminal Justice with 1st year standing or higher.
- Demonstrate they are in good standing

**Note:** Recipients must maintain registration (part/full time) throughout the academic year upon receiving the award. Preference will be given to Black, Indigenous and/or Racialized students.
