

## **Graduate Special Topics Instructions**

Please review the following definitions before proceeding. This form is for the designation of Graduate <u>Special</u> Topics only. If the course does not meet the definition of a special topics course according to the definitions, do not send this form.

### **Definitions:**

**Special** Topics normally address topics chosen from a broad range of topics within a discipline. Their topics vary widely from year-to-year. Students may repeat special topics courses for credit when the topics vary.

**Selected** Topics courses normally address topics which fall within a narrow range of topics within a common theme indicated by the course title. Students may not repeat selected topics courses for credit.

- 1. Fill out one form for each special topic. Save each topic as a separate document.
- 2. The calendar entry does not change. The topic will appear at <a href="https://gradstudents.carleton.ca/special-topics/">https://gradstudents.carleton.ca/special-topics/</a>
- 3. Special Topics offered three consecutive times should normally be reviewed to determine if a new course should be developed.

- 5. It is the responsibility of the proposing academic unit to ensure that cross-listing units also submit a special topics proposal form.
- Courses that are dual-numbered with 4000-level courses (piggybacked) must have the approval of both appropriate faculty associate deans (line associate dean for 4000-level, FGPA associate dean for 5000).
- 7. For Banner procedures and timelines, refer to the Special Topics Processes memorandum from the Registrar's Office.
