Prerequisite(s): ECON 2020 with a grade of C- or higher or ECON 2009 with a grade of C+ or higher, and ECON 1402 (or equivalent) with a grade of C- or higher. Students who believe they have taken a similar background course or courses from another university must provide appropriate documentation to the Department of Economics Undergraduate Administrator, Amanda Wright. A grade of C+ or higher is required to qualify for ECON 3900, 3920, and 4020.

Course Objective:

This course analyzes consumer choice and the economics of demand and supply in general equilibrium. We will also consider choice under uncertainty and asymmetric information.

We will use a number of tools from mathematics to formalize economic models and analyze economic issues. Therefore, students must be familiar with basic algebra, calculus and geometry.

Exams:

There will be two midterm exams and a final exam. Each midterm exam will be given during regular class-time. Excuses for missed exams must be pre-approved except when this is not possible in an emergency situation. If you miss a mid-term examination for a documented compelling reason, the weight of the midterm will be reallocated to the final exam. No makeup will be offered. If you are sick, I should get an email about it before the exam. A doctor's note will be needed to validate the illness. Please also see accommodation list below.
