<u>Course Description:</u> This course focuses on the development of individual research projects in various suitable economics topics. Students will engage in in-class discussions and present their findings at each stage through written and oral reports. The course concludes with the completion of a major research paper by each participant.

<u>Learning Outcomes:</u> Throughout the course, students will enhance their presentation skills and their ability to identify research questions, find relevant data, and conduct comprehensive research analysis. This collaborative and progressive approach ensures that students refine their research skills and deepen their understanding of economic analysis.

<u>Preclusions and Prerequisites:</u> ECON 3900 with a grade of C+ or higher, ECON 3920 with a grade of C+ or higher, and registration in an Honours Economics program. Students who believe they have taken a similar background course or courses from another university must provide appropriate documentation to the Department of Economics Undergraduate Administrator, Renee Lortie. Precludes additional credit for ECON 4890, ECON 4900 (no longer offered), ECON 4901 (no longer offered), and ECON 4902 (no longer offered).

<u>Presentations</u>: Students will deliver three presentations during the course: one for the initial proposal, one for preliminary findings, and a final presentation. These presentations are scheduled to occur on specific dates and are expected to be in person. In exceptional situations, the presentation dates may be adjusted by a week. Please inform the instructor as early as possible if you have a scheduling conflict. To ensure all presentations fit within one lecture session, students must submit their slides as a PDF online a few days before their presentation. Detailed instructions for submission and deadlines will be provided closer to the presentation dates. To maintain fairness, all presentations of the same type will have the same submission deadline. Time limits for each presenter will be strictly enforced to accommodate all participants.

<u>Peer Review and Support:</u> Students will be randomly grouped into teams of 3-4 members. These teams are tasked with offering critiques and feedback on each other's work. This feedback should be akin to referee reports or conference discussants, providing professional and constructive criticism. Students are encouraged to engage with their team members throughout the term, especially during weeks without formal lectures. These teams can help students stay accountable and motivated to make steady progress on their final papers.

<u>Late Submissions</u>: Any graded material submitted late will incur a penalty of 50% per day. For example, an assignment worth 10% of the final grade that would have earned 90% (or 9 grade points) if submitted on time will earn 45% (or 4.5 grade points) if submitted one day late. If submitted two days late or more, it will receive a grade of 0.

**Honours Essay:** The objective of this assignment is to create an original research paper, your honours essay. The essay should be 5,000 words or less and can address any topic related to economics. Most students opt to write an empirical paper, though an original theoretical paper is also acceptable. Papers that merely summarize or review extensive literature are not allowed. Due to the tight timeline, most students prefer to write an empirical paper. Along with the final paper, students must present their main findings in a final presentation.

<u>Statistical Software</u>: All empirical work will be done using Stata. Carleton students can download Stata <u>here</u> (no cost).
