WHAT TO DO

- **Know your area**'s risk for thunderstorms
 - In most places, they can occur year-round at any time
- Sign up for local alerts and warnings
 - Learn the difference between Warnings & Watches
- Identify nearby sturdy buildings close to where you live and work
- Cut down or trim trees that could fall and damage your property
- Consider buying surge protectors, or a lightning protection system for your home

WHAT TO DO

- Stay indoors
 - Sturdy buildings are the safest places to be during a thunderstorm
- Avoid flooded roadways
 - Six inches of fast-moving water can knock a person down
 - One foot of fast-moving water can sweep vehicles away
- If indoors, avoid running water or using landline phones
- Protect your property
 - Unplug appliances and other electronic devices
- If necessary, take shelter in a car with a metal top and sides
 - DO NOT touch anything metal to avoid electrocution

WHAT TO DO

- Pay attention to weather alerts and be ready to change plans if necessary
 - Listen to authorities for instructions regarding potential flash flooding
- Watch for fallen power lines and trees
 - Report any potential safety hazards to the appropriate authorities
