

How to Prepare for a Fire

Prepare

WHAT TO DO

- Create and practice a fire escape plan
 - Have at least two ways to get out of a room
 - Make sure windows do not stick and security locks can be disabled
- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home
 - Frequently test them and change the batteries when necessary
- Make digital copies of important documents (ie: birth certificates, policies)
- Invest in a fire extinguisher
 - Get it checked regularly and learn how to properly use it
- Consider installing an automated sprinkler system in your home

During

WHAT TO DO

- If you can, stay low to the ground to avoid excess smoke
 - Heavy smoke and other poisonous gases collect along the ceiling
- Feel closed doors before you open them
 - Use the back of your hand or other extremities to touch the door
 - DO NOT open doors that feel hot or have smoke coming through them
- If your clothes catch fire STOP DROP & ROLL
 - Cover your face with your hands and roll on the ground
 - o For those who cannot stop, drop and roll smother the flames with a blanket
 - Use cool water to treat any burns
- Tell first responders if you were unable to help someone evacuate
 - Let first responders know if there are pets inside
- If you cannot evacuate, close any doors and cover vents and cracks with cloth
 - Call 9-1-1 and signal for help when first responders arrive

After

WHAT TO DO

- Contact your local disaster relief service for help during the recovery process
 - They may be able to help with temporary housing or food and medicine
- Contact your insurance company for instructions on how to protect property
 If you are not insured, try contacting private organizations for aid
- Check with the fire department to make sure your home is safe to enter
 - They should make sure that utilities are safe to use or are disconnected
- Conduct an inventory of damaged property
 - DO NOT throw away anything that has not been accounted for
- Locate important documents and records
