






Your greatest accomplishment as an MP in the 42nd Parliament:

- "Representing my constituents"
- "Mobilized people around the issue of climate change"
- "Influencing two key pieces of legislation"
- "Banning asbestos"
- "Work on committees"
- "Medical assistance in dying legislation"

On the whole, how satisfied are you with the House of Commons as a forum for debate and decision-making?

45% responded "Not very satisfied" or "Not satisfied at all"

Your greatest regret in the 42nd Parliament:

"I didn't truly figure out what I could actually accomplish and how until three years in."



"Not starting early and stronger in my work to fundamentally rehabilitate the institution." "Partisanship!"



"I didn't realize until later how influential an individual MP was... so I can do a lot more now than I could in my first couple of years. But it takes time to learn and build confidence."

from my own leadership and their staff








2) Use innovative tools in the Constituency

- Polling




3) Use Supports and ask Questions


