## **CSE COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

**EFFECTIVE 2024 SUMMER TERM:** To be acceptable for inclusion in your degree, a complementary studies elective (CSE) must meet <u>all</u> of the following requirements:

- has 3 hours of lecture per week (can include up to 1 hour tutorial/discussion time);
- subject matter that deals with the humanities and social sciences;
- includes an assessment of written material;
- is **not** a "learning language" course;
- must have a synchronous component.

NOTE: Courses completed in previous terms will <u>not</u> be reconsidered for inclusion in the BEng degree under these CSE guidelines.

**Note:** The following list of CSEs is **subject to change** as we review course outlines near the start of the term to verify that the courses meet the requirements listed above.

## **ECOR 2995**

<u>All</u> BEng students with catalog years 201930 and later are required to complete the Engineering Portfolio: ECOR 2995 by their fourth year. The portfolio <u>must</u> include:

- 1. The course outline of the CSE that you completed
- 2. An essay, project report, and/or research paper completed as a requirement of the CSE
