This intensive two-term course has a number of aims: (1) to provide a general introduction to the history of literary studies; (2) to familiarize students with a range of critical practices; (3) to explore how "literature" has been theorized as an object of study; (4) to help students deepen their ability to read and respond to both theory and literary criticism; (5) to explore how literary and cultural critics employ and engage with theory in their analyses of texts; (6) to provide students with opportunities to practice engaging meaningfully with theory and criticism in their own critical work; (7) to encourage reflection on the value of the humanities and the reasons we read and analyze literature and popular fiction. To these ends, the first term explores structuralist, narratological, deconstructive, and psychoanalytic approaches to literary study. The second term examines ethical, Marxist, postcolonial, and ecocritical approaches to literary and cultural studies, paying particular attention to the intersection of these approaches with psychoanalysis and with each other. A diverse selection of short stories, novels, poetry, and film will accompany and illuminate our reading of theory and criticism.

## **Method of Evaluation**

Students are expected to attend class in person and participate regularly. In addition to an attendance/participation grade (20%), evaluation will consist of formal writing assignments in both fall and winter (30%), a group presentation on an assigned secondary source (10%), and inperson exams at the end of each term (40%).
