**Course description:** This course explores the diverse ways in which illness is narrated in literary media, with a particular focus on how personal identity and the self are constructed and deconstructed through these narratives. Are illness narratives "technologies" of the self? Students will engage with a variety of texts, including graphic novels, memoirs, essays, and fiction, to examine how illness impacts individual and collective experiences and how these experiences are articulated through literary forms.

## **Learning Outcomes:**

- To understand and analyze the ways in which illness narratives contribute to our understanding of the self.
- To critically examine the intersections of illness, identity, and society.
- To reflect on media "technologies" and the distinction between artificial intelligence and emotional intelligence.
- To explore the narrative techniques and stylistic choices authors use to convey experiences of illness and identity.

- To engage with a range of genres, including graphic novels, to appreciate the multimodal aspects of illness narratives.
- To develop critical thinking, reading, oral and writing skills through analysis and discussion of course materials.
