

### **Course Description**

In this course, we will look at how writers represent characters "breaking bad" into a life of vice and lawlessness. Crime and punishment is a hotly debated issue that dominates our cultural imagination and our public media. Not surprisingly, authors from Shakespeare to the writers of the *Breaking Bad* series have turned their attention to excavating the roots of crime, its social and personal motivations, its impact on individuals and societies, and ultimately its consequences for both perpetrators and victims. This course serves as an introduction to the study of literature through the thematic lens of crime, justice, and criminality

#### **Course Regulations**

Class participation marks will include participation in class discussion, response to written comments on graded assignments, consistent attendance, and full reading preparation for each assigned text. As consistent attendance is expected in this class, students are required to attend an absolute **minimum of 20%** of the classes; students failing to meet this minimum requirement will not have their assignments graded.

All assignments must be handed in on the date specified unless cleared previously with the professor. Papers must be handed to me in person or to the drop box in the English department office (1812 Dunton Tower) on the due date. If you choose to use the drop box, you must be prepared to incur any late penalties that may accumulate due to the unlikely occurrence of the paper's loss or misfiling.

Late papers and projects will be penalized **2% per day** that the assignment is overdue. Papers without medical extension will not be accepted after two weeks of the due date. No faxes or emails of essays will be accepted. Please keep a copy of your assignment in case of loss by any cause. Students can expect to receive graded feedback in a timely manner; the instructor reserves the right to limit commentary on late essays. Students are required to submit all major assignments (both essays and exam) in order to pass the course as a whole.

#### **Plagiarism**

The University Senate defines plagiarism as "presenting, whether intentionally or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own."

#### This can include:

- --reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- --submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- --using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- --using another's data or research findings;
- --failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- --handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs."

Plagiarism is a serious offence that cannot be resolved directly by the course's instructor. The Associate Dean of the Faculty conducts a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course.
