COURSE DESCRIPTION: ENGL 3903A Intermediate Fiction Workshop – Winter Term 2018 (Mark Frutkin)

Course prerequisites: a 2000-level creative writing workshop or permission of the instructor

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

As this is a fiction writing workshop, the main focus of this creative writing course will involve the analysis and evaluation of short fiction manuscripts (short stories or portions of novels) by the professor and the students taking the course. Students will be expected to have a serious interest in the craft of writing and have a solid grasp of fundamentals.

Analysis and evaluation of others' manuscripts will be almost as important as your own submitted work. Only fiction will be evaluated (no poetry). All styles of writing will be acceptable, the only criterion being the excellence of the actual writing itself.

Some classes will include in-class writing exercises, and discussions about writing and publishing.

A selected number of writers will submit a manuscript each week for others to take home and read and be prepared to workshop the following week. Each student will submit two original manuscripts, of 5-7 pages each, during the course (or a total of 14-15 pages).

Each student must photocopy sufficient copies of their own story to hand out the week preceding their workshop. If you are scheduled to deliver a manuscript and cannot, please give several days' notice. If your manuscript is to be discussed and you cannot appear, please give as much notice as possible.

Every manuscript submission must be typed, double spaced in ordinary typeface, and must be legible. Handwritten materials will not be accepted. No single spacing is allowed, as space is required for hand-written editorial comments. (Since no textbooks or other books will be required for the course, students will be expected to cover the cost of photocopying the required number of copies of their own stories.) Photocopying on both sides of a page, to save paper, will be acceptable.

EVALUATION:

The final course grade will be based on the following:

- 1) 65% Quality and originality of the work submitted.
- 2) 30% Quality of the editorial comments on the work of others written and oral (in-class) contributions to the overall manuscript evaluation process.

3) 5% - Attendance - Missing more than three classes will result in a grade reduction, barring medical situations (a doctor's note is required). Arriving late to the class on a consistent basis will affect the final grade.

There will be no final exam in this course.

Please Note: You must be willing to have your own work criticized and evaluated in class in order to learn from that criticism, and you must be willing to deliver critiques of others' manuscripts that are forthright, helpful and positive in nature. Please bring writing materials (pen and paper or notebook) to all classes.
