# **Topic:** "Those Damn Scribbling Women" (N. Hawthorne)

This course will focus on 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> century American women's writing. ### **SEMINARS:**

Class presentations will focus on an aspect of the text under study that week. Presentations will address questions raised by the narrative, explore problems in relation to it, and/or assess its social and cultural movements.

### **ESSAY TOPIC**

Due Date: November 16, 2016 Length: 2500-3000 words (10-12 pp.)

Students will submit a critical assessment of one of the questions (or problems) that has arisen from the course material. Essays will comprise well-researched and scholarly analyses of the issue under study, after that issue has been approved by the professor.
