ENGL 2802A: Indigenous and Canadian Literatures

I Course Description: English 2802A introduces you to many different kinds of texts, including literary works like novels, poems, short stories, life writing, a play, and a film as well as forms of non-fiction such as exploration narratives, an emigrant guidebook, policy documents, and a critical essay, produced in and/or about the part of Turtle Island called Canada. Moving through a selection of texts from and about different geographical and geopolitical regions, the course invites you to consider how writers from across generations and across cultures use language to imagine and articulate their relationships to land, place, history, and community in sometimes conflicting, sometimes intersecting ways.

II Learning Outcomes: Students in this class will learn to analyze and interpret the formal strategies through which authors articulate divergent relationships to land, place, and history. They will develop their skills in close reading, secondary research, critical thinking, and persuasive argumentation.

III ENGL 2802 is a “**writing attentive**” course, which means that:

- Students will write at least one examination or culminating reflective assignment
- Students will complete a number of writing assignments (including at least one formal essay) in which they are expected to do the following:
 - i. develop an argument across each piece of writing
 - ii. develop complex and persuasive arguments using persuasive, clear and grammatically correct English
 - iii. develop literary reading skills through close analysis of poetry and/or prose passages
 - iv. use and cite evidence from primary texts appropriately, using the MLA documentation style
 - v. develop secondary research and citation skills

A portion of class time will be devoted to developing and improving research and writing skills, including essay-writing skills.
