COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course introduces students to the fascinating intersection between literature and magic, with an emphasis on nineteenth- and twentieth-century authors. We will study literary representations of alchemy and witchcraft in occult fiction and the weird tale; the emergence of modern fantasy out of the Irish literary revival; the links between poetry and ritual magic; the relation between stage magic and the unconscious mind; as well as the poetics and politics of contemporary magical realism. As we explore these and other topics, students will be introduced to techniques of literary analysis, research, and writing at a university level.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: Students will explore topics in the history of magic in Europe and North America, from the medieval period to the present; learn about the ways in which literary authors have represented magic in novels, short fiction, drama, and poetry; hone skills in comprehension and close reading; develop skills in literary analysis, critical thinking, and written expression.
