

Planning for next year: ESP/IESP to Degree

I have been admitted to a degree; what's next?

Where can I go for help with registration or for advice?

- Registrar's office: Runs the Registration Assistance program in the summer for help registering for fall/winter courses. The RO can help with registration issues, letters confirming enrolment, transcripts, exam deferrals, etc. 300 Tory carleton.ca/registrar
- **Departments**: Need help getting into a course? Fill out an override request form on Carleton Central. Talk to departmental advisors about course selection for the major, practicum & coop options, where their degree can lead.
- **Academic Advising Centre**: Advising, graduation requirements, program changes, adding/dropping a major/minor, academic difficulty support. 302 Tory <u>academicadvising@carleton.ca</u>.

How do I choose courses for next year?

- 1) The Calendar: <u>carleton.ca/cuuc</u> Follow the link to "Programs".
- 2) Use your **Audit/Statement of Standing**. This will outline required courses. You will receive this with their Offer of Admission. You can also run an audit in Carleton Central.
- 3) Go to:
 - Registration Assistance at the Registrar's office 300 Tory
 - Advising appointment at SASC 302 Tory
 - The registration how-to site.

Where can I go for academic support next year?

Registration tip:

Some classes next year require "second year standing" to register. Others just require the first year intro course as a prerequisite. If you're taking a credit this summer, you may be on your way to second year standing. Once you've done 4.0 credits, you'll have it. Or ask the department for permission to take a course requiring second year standing.

What happens if I haven't qualified for a degree?

As long as you haven't been suspended from study through the <u>Academic Performance Evaluation</u> (suspension for ESP/IESP students normally = if your CGPA is less than D-), you can continue taking classes as a special student, or apply to return to ESP.

See below for options, to discuss these in detail, meet with us.

- a) Summer Courses: Summer courses may help.
 - If you are currently enrolled in summer courses, admissions may be able to use those grades in considering you for fall admission.

b) Courses next Fall/Winter

- If the fall, you may be able to continue taking classes as a special student, or apply to return to ESP.
- Depending on your record and/or program of interest, you may be able to qualify for a degree in January, or next fall.

Returning to ESP	Special student studies
 Apply to return to ESP: for the fall or fall/winter terms. Deadline to apply is June 30, 2022 (but may be extended, space permitting). Students take a core course of their choosing plus two more first year courses with workshops (1.5 credits per term). May be OSAP eligible (OSAP will only fund eligible ESP for 3 terms max.). Awards can answer your OSAP inquiries. Can apply for bursary, band funding or bank student lines of credit. 	 Contact an ESP advisor or fill out the Special Student Application to request to be switched to a Special Student for Fall 2022. Can take a maximum of 1.0 credit per term (part-time). Can register in courses that have space available (and that you have the prerequisite for). Fall course registration begins August 5th (note: selection can be limited). Not OSAP eligible.
