Registration tip:

Some classes next year require "second year standing" to register. Others just require the first year intro course as a prerequisite. If you're taking a credit this summer, you may be on your way to second year standing. Once you've done 4.0 credits, you'll have it. Or ask the department for permission to take a course requiring second year standing.

What happens if I haven't qualified for a degree?

As long as you haven't been suspended from study through the <u>Academic Performance Evaluation</u> (suspension for ESP/IESP students normally = if your CGPA is less than D-), you can continue taking classes as a special student, or apply to return to ESP/IESP.

- a) Summer Courses: Summer courses may help.
 - If you are currently enrolled in summer courses, admissions may be able to use those grades in considering you for fall admission.

b) Courses next Fall/Winter

- If the fall, you may be able to continue taking classes as a special student, or apply to return to ESP/IESP.
- Depending on your record and/or program of interest, you may be able to qualify for a degree in January, or next fall.

Returning to ESP/IESP	Special student studies
 Apply to return to ESP or IESP: for the fall or fall/winter terms. Deadline to apply is June 30, 2020 (but likely to be extended, space permitting). Students take a core course of their choosing plus two more first year courses with workshops (1.5 credits per term). May be OSAP eligible (OSAP will only fund eligible ESP/IESP for 3 terms max.). Awards can answer your OSAP inquiries. Can apply for bursary, band funding or bank student lines of credit. 	 Online application (no fee) is here. Can take a maximum of 1.0 credit per term (part-time). Can register in courses that have space available (and that you have the prerequisite for). Fall course registration begins August 6th (note: selection can be limited). Not OSAP eligible.
