C. General requirements

Thesis/Research Essay requirements: To satisfy the requirements of the EURUS MA, students must use at least five sources in a European language other than English in their thesis/research essay. Students whose thesis or research essay involves research with human subjects (surveys, interviews, focus groups, etc.) must obtain ethics clearance from Carleton's Office of Research Ethics and Compliance.

Language requirements: By the end of their studies, students need to demonstrate reading proficiency in a European language other than English; they must use research sources in that language in their Research Essay. Reading proficiency is demonstrated through a translation exam administered at CU or by successfully completing language courses specified in the CU Graduate Calendar. Native speakers can be exempted from the translation exam.
