
Marc Saurette, Associate Professor

- Currently teaching, "Medieval Manuscripts in the Digital Age" (HIST 4006 – 18 students)
- The class works with Archives and Special Collections, Carleton University Art Gallery and the Book Arts Lab to allow students to have a hands-on experience with medieval manuscripts (oldest folios fourteenth cent.)
- Students study, catalogue, present and transform the medieval texts



Experiential Design


- Assignments are designed around practical concerns how to describe and research the folios about which there is not an official catalogue
- Students learn by doing they learn about medieval manuscript production by studying and then reproducing (by hand) the writing process
- They learn about the history of the book by converting the book into print (typeset) editions and digital versions

Book Arts Lab Project: Context



- Created a 3-tier book art project to represent different sociopolitical intersections Newcomer's face in Canada
- Compare, contrast, highlight the gaps in communication between the "Candian ideology" and the realities of daily life

Experiential Learning in Academia

- Increases productivity and inclusion for individuals with different learning styles
- Increases class-mate driven interactions and classroom attendance
- Increases information retention
- Allows students free'er'-reign to investigate topics that interest them, and gives them the tools/options to choose their method of presentation



Sarah Pelletier (she/her), PhD Candidate

- Second year; Department of English
- Research Focuses:
 - Book History
 - Print History
 - (Women's) Labour History
 - Gender in the North American typographical trades during the long nineteenth century
- Book Arts Lab Project: creating chapbook called pressed and an accompanying "how-to" guide



The Book Arts Lab, Book History, and Literature

- Spaces like the Book Arts Lab allow students to explore materials and technologies of early methods of printing through creative means, not always as a direct correlation to academic work (but of course there is a relationship)
- Begins to answer questions like:
 - How did these books get here?
 - Who made them? When? How?

pressed: Created in the Book Arts Lab









- Opens a discussion about form and content
 - A "collection of pressed things"
- "How-to" Guide
 - Encourages students to look at the relationship between form and content
 - Walks students through the process of creating a codex, from planning to binding (steps which can be applied to other forms, such as broadsides)
 - A supplement, not a replacement for, hands-on instruction in the Lab




Experiential Learning + Theory = More Knowledge

- Students can see the bodies of lead type which are otherwise invisible when looking at printed texts
- Students are encouraged to approach literary production and literature as a very human subject and to recognize that authors are not the only human agents involved in the histories of literature
- Taking a practical understanding of different elements of the book arts back to their literary studies in the classroom enlivens, enhances, and informs students' continuing exploration of their fields
