Course Description:

This course examines the effects of colonization in unbalancing Indigenous peoples' lives through the imposition of constructions of gender, sex, and sexuality, and the ways that Indigenous peoples are working to restore balance to their families and communities.

Thus, working from a pedagogical framework centred in Indigenous feminisms, this course focusses on the ways Indigenous women, Two Spirit and gender non-conforming peoples generate and mobilize epistemologies of resistance, resurgence and renewal. This course emphasizes and celebrates decolonial ontologies that are centred in the land, cosmologies, and critical pedagogies that undermine mechanisms of oppression as sanctioned by settler states. Through examinations of various decolonial feminist perspectives, this course aims to initiate an ontological summoning of ideas, gestures of rebellion, promising praxis and manifestos of sovereignty that honour, uphold and celebrate Indigenous movements towards liberation.
