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SYNOPSIS

Students in Food Science and Nutrition carry out a research project under the direction of a faculty member or external researcher. A written report and an oral presentation of the work are required before a grade can be assigned. Laboratory and associated work equivalent to <u>at least eight hours per week</u> during the fall and winter terms is required. Prerequisite(s): fourth-year standing in the Food Science and Nutrition program and permission of the department.

LEARNING OUTCOME AND OBJECTIVES

This is a capstone course for the Food Science and Nutrition program. The learning outcome of this course: *conduct independent research that extends current knowledge in food science and nutrition*. Through this course, you will:

- Carry out hypothesis-driven research
- Perform basic lab techniques
- Learn and perform new lab techniques
- Work independently
- Analyze data and perform statistical analysis
- Describe principles and mechanisms with appropriate depth
- Support arguments with primary scientific studies
- Provide systematic review of state of knowledge
