1. Chair called the meeting to order at $2: 35 \mathrm{pm}$.
2. Approval of agenda (B. Woo/J. Malloy). Approved.
3. Approval of minutes of April 6, 2022 (V. Bhatia/B. Woo). Approved.
4. Matters Arising
D. Mendeloff noted that the Constitutional changes approved in April are not yet approved by Senate.
5. Chair's Remarks
D. Mendeloff reminded members that we were not successful in electing a Secretary or Clerk at our meeting last April. Executive has appointed D. Mendeloff as Interim Secretary. We still do not have a Clerk. S. Bourk has kindly agreed to take minutes until that position can be filled. David encouraged
anyone interested in filling that role this year, to contact a member of Executive. He also encouraged members to put their names forward for Secretary and Clerk for the next academic term (2024-25).
6. Question Period
P. Cloutier de Repetigny asked if there has been any follow-up or actions taken as a result of Dr. Woo's report Seeking Equity in Tenure \& Promotion: A Review of FPA Unit Standards, and/or if there is otherwise anything in the works regarding the report. Dean O'Neill made note that this report has been shared with Chairs and Directors and that there are no other plans at the moment.
7. Report from Provost and Vice-President (Academic)

Provost P. Rankin provided an overview of issues she will be focusing on this year, particularly enrolment concerns and the impact on budgets, and the reorganization of FGPA. She invited questions from the members.

The Provost was asked about the future of Graduate Faculty Board. She confirmed that the conversations of reworking Grad Faculty Board have taken place and are underway currently, and that the reorganization of FGPA will be completed this year.

The Provost was asked if she anticipated any tuition increases for out-of-province students. She confirmed that tuition has been frozen for Ontario students, therefore those with a permanent residency in Ontario will not be affected by any out-of-province increases.

Allan Thompson raised the concern about under-utilized common space in Richcraft Hall and asked if the space could be better utilized by students for small social gatherings and studying, similar to Nicol. B. O'Neill confirmed this concern was noted and will raise it with Facilities Management and Planning.

Dean O'Neill presented a report on the state of the Faculty, particularly declining new first-year enrolments and current budget realities. She invited questions from members.

The Dean was asked to clarify how decisions are made regarding the allocation of CRCs in the Faculty. She noted that the number of CRC's that Carleton receives is determined by overall TriCouncil funding and allocated proportionally to each Faculty.

The Dean was asked about what is being done to address challenges with Research Services. She noted that a university committee has been struck, and that Erin Tolley, CRC in Political Science, is representing the Faculty on that committee.

November 2023
Associate Dean (Research and Graduate) Report for Faculty Board

The research prowess of FPA continues. We were pleased to see Carleton recently ranked \#1 in Canada among comprehensive universities for social sciences and humanities research grants by Maclean's. We of course share this distinction with colleagues in FASS and other Faculties, but I will note that within Carleton, FPA has had the highest Faculty rate of success in recent competitions. Just sayin'.

As always, I want to emphasize that while success in external grants is important, the real impact of our research is ultimately in knowledge mobilization and exchange and social and policy impact. We are always exploring new ways to communicate and promote our research impact and I invite faculty to keep us in ODFPA informed about ways in which FPA research is making a difference.

Author Meets Readers - We are delighted to continue the longstanding Author Meets Readers program with our partner and host, Irene's Pub, as well as Octopus Books. In October we featured Brett Popplewell's (Journalism) exciting book Outsider. On November 30 we welcome William Walters (Political Science) and his edited collection Viapolitics: Borders, Migration, and the Power of Locomotion.

We are testing hybrid options for AMR. The technical challenges in the pub space are significant, but we're very pleased to offer this YouTube recording of the Outsider event with Brett and colleague Sarah Everts.

Bagels and Banter - While AMR roars ahead, we have placed Bagels and Banter on hiatus. For years this program allowed a 'sandbox' opportunity to explore and receive feedback on new teaching and research ideas, while chowing down on fine Kettleman's products. However, interest and
 attendance has weakened and we received no submissions for opportunities this year. Unless there is clear renewed demand, B+B will be discontinued, though we will look for new opportunities for faculty to engage in cross-unit and crossdisciplinary conversations.

Small Grants - November 27 is the final day for applications to the fall gate of the FPA Small Grants program. The two grants are:

The Research Completion Grant: Up to $\$ 3000$ to help a research project "get past a significant hurdle in order to complete the project." The most common use is to assist with book publication costs, but we are always open to other ideas. Key criteria are that the investment will clearly lead to the end of the project, and that funds are definitely needed to get over the hurdle.

The Research Initiation Grant: Up to $\$ 3000$ to initiate new research projects. This Grant is particularly intended for faculty who have not recently held grants and need a little money to kick start a project. We are particularly open to faculty who have not recently been research-active and are searching to change that. While not a requirement, ideally this grant will lead to an external grant application.

More information and the application form are available here.

We continue to recognize the long-term impacts of the pandemic. The Small Grants form includes an opportunity for a COVID-19 impact statement to describe any special circumstances.

Graduate Matters: Beginning this year I have assumed responsibilty for Tri-Council and OGS graduate awards as well as internal awards, working closely between units and FGPA. I am grateful to David Mendeloff for setting up a durable process for me to follow. I retain responsibility for formally setting unit recruitment targets and the distribution of our too-few international 13k packages. I also represent FPA at Graduate Faculty Board. Given the broad range and slow devolution of gradudate and FGPA matters, we continue to share graduate responsibilities across several Associate Dean portfolios and work as a team.

Emerging Perspectives - The call for proposals for Emerging Perspectives 2024 is imminent. Please draw your graduate students' attention to this opportunity. This is the fifth EP conference and it has consistently been a great opportunity for graduate students in both academic and professional programs to present their research and enjoy what is often their first professional conference. We will also be approaching faculty as panel discussants and we look forward to your enthusiastic and affirmative responses!

I wish to draw the following points to the attention of Faculty Board.
Hiring Recruitment and Planning Officer
As I noted at the October meeting of Faculty Board, the Dean's Office is currently hiring for the position of Recruitment and Planning Officer within FPA. With the added responsibilities for assisting with graduate recruitment, in-depth data analysis and strategic planning for both undergrad and grad recruitment programming, the position has been reclassified from a Level 8 to a Level 9 full-time continuing CUPE 2424 position. We received fifty applications in total and are now reviewing and screening the 45 applicants who are not members of CUPE 2424. Our goal is to make an offer in early December so that the successful candidate may start after the holiday break.

## CUROP

Since at least 2017, FPA has awarded summer research internships to undergraduate students through the Carleton University Research Opportunity Program (CUROP). While students work under the supervision of a faculty member, the expectation is that they will design and carry out their own research projects with a significant degree of autonomy.

In past years, award stipends have been $\$ 7,500$ for the summer, with an expectation that they engage in their research on a full-time or near full time basis from early May until the end of August. However, although the stipend has remained constant since 2017, its real value has declined over time. Further, the Ontario minimum wage has increased from $\$ 11.40$ per hour to $\$ 16.55$ per hour over that period. This means that there is a significant opportunity cost for students who choose to participate in CUROP instead of accepting other summer employment.

This year, the Dean has approved an increase in the CUROP stipend to $\$ 10,000$ per student for research over the summer. We hope that this will more appropriately reward students for their work and continue to encourage high quality applications.

We will begin advertising the 2024 awards on December $1^{\text {st }}$, and applications will be open until the end of February 2024.

Students are responsible for finding suitable supervisors to provide advice and to oversee their work. While supervision is not intended to be as onerous as, say, supervising an Honours

Research Essay, it does involve helping students to develop a work plan, including identifying realistic deliverables, and checking in with them regularly to ensure they are on track. The willingness of faculty members to generously assist students by providing such supervision is essential for running the CUROP program, and I am grateful for those who are willing to serve in this way. If you are asked by students to act as their supervisor, I hope that you will consider it if you can. And if you know of talented students who might be thinking of pursuing graduate studies and might enjoy and benefit from a summer of paid research, please think about bringing this opportunity to their attention.

## Academic Integrity

I reported to the October Faculty Board meeting that academic integrity violations were lower, at this point in the semester, than in other recent years. Cases have grown since that meeting, and as of November $20^{\text {th }}$ I have found 13 violations, for a total of 14 so far this academic year. The following chart shows this academic year to date (July $1^{\text {st }}$ to November $20^{\text {th }}$ ) in comparison to other years at the same point in time.

## TA Allocation

TA allocation for Winter 2024 is underway and should be finalized by mid-December. Instructors are asked to please review the TA assignments for their courses, complete the Assignment of Duties (AOD) form in Carleton Central no later than December 15 ${ }^{\text {th }}$, and make sure TAs sign off on those duties. Incomplete AOD forms will be interpreted to mean that a TA is not required for the course, and the TA may be re-assigned elsewhere.

TAs who have exhausted their priority terms may apply to have their priority extended. Applications for Winter 2024 are due no later than December 1. More information and application forms can be found on the Teaching Assistants webpage of the Office of the Deputy Provost - Academic Operations and Planning.

Instructors with TAs who may be needed to completed grading during the University Closure Period (December 23 to January 3) must request approval before assigning duties. Please contact me ASAP if you have not already done so.

Undergraduate Curriculum, Regulations, and Policies

> Senate has approved the new Academic Consideration Policy for short and long-term student accommodation and it will come into effect on January 1, 2024. This policy replaces the previous medical accommodation policy and formalizes the use of student self-declarations for short-term academic consideration requests under specified conditions. Guidelines for instructors, course template language and procedures for students can be found on the FPA/FASS Teaching Regulations webpage. Please review this information for all graduate and undergraduate courses and assignments.

## Academic Policy and Curriculum Committee (APCC)

This committee, which I chair, has biweekly over the Fall term to review program and course change proposals from each unit. The second of two packages of proposed modifications for 2024-25 will be presented to Faculty Board for approval at the November $27^{\text {th }}$ meeting. I'd like to thank APCC members for their efforts to advance undergraduate curriculum review and renewal.

## Senate Committee on Curriculum, Admissions and Studies Policy (SCCASP)

I represent FPA on this committee, which has had six meetings so far this term. SCCASP reviews graduate and undergraduate curricular, admissions, and policy change proposals from all faculties, including those from FPA Faculty Board, for Senate approval.

## Undergraduate Affairs Committee (UGAF)

The UGAF has met three times this fall. The Committee is considering implementation issues surrounding the academic consideration policy, and requests by student groups to improve students' access to course outlines to aid course selection and planning.

## Graduate Curriculum and Planning

FGPA's Programs and Planning Committee has met several times to review proposed changes to graduate programs and courses. All major and minor modifications proposed by FPA units have been recommended to GFB for approval.

## Exam Scheduling

As instructors prepare their winter term course outlines, I want to highlight the variety of options available to you for scheduling end-of-term exams. Many instructors schedule a take home exam on the last day of the term, which is due on the last day of the official exam period. Scheduling an exam through Scheduling and Exam Services (SES) may give you several other options, including formally scheduled:

- Proctored in-person written exams;
- Proctored in-person digital exams (e.g., on Brightspace or similar platform);
- E-proctored exams, either in-person or remote;
- Take-home exams, with or without a fixed duration.

## Equity, Diversity and Inclusion

I was a member of the appointment committee for the new Associate Dean, EDI, which is now complete.
I convened a meeting of the Faculty’s Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (JEDI) Working Group on October 30, 2023. There was discussion at this meeting of the various initiatives of and challenges experienced with promoting EDI at the unit level.

Appointments and Governance. I've been involved in a number of appointment- and governancerelated processes, including: leading the search process for a new director for the School of Social Work; appointment of the Bell Chair for the Study of Canadian Parliamentary Democracy; and chairing an advisory committee to the Dean to review the current leadership structure in the School of Journalism and Communication and to develop procedural guidelines for selecting leadership positions in the School.

The Senate Ad-Hoc Committee on Graduate Academic Governance (SGAG). The committee, which was created to advise Senate and the Provost on how to manage the decentralization of graduate curriculum matters to the line Faculties, has continued to meet. We are on track to provide a report in January recommending which curriculum-related responsibilities should move to the Faculties and which should remain centralized, and the implications for Senate governance, including any changes to the membership and responsibilities of Senate committees. The committee will also be reviewing the various graduate curriculum governance processes identified in the Faculty constitutions and will make recommendations to the Senate Academic Governance Committee (SAGC) for any necessary changes.

New FPA Excellence Award. I am happy to announce a new FPA Excellence award for community engagement. We are finalizing the terms of reference, but in general terms the award is intended to recognize those who have made an exceptional contribution to building or strengthening institutional relationships between FPA and the broader local, provincial, national and/or international community.

Faculty Board and Constitution. I have been working on updates to the FPA Constitution. I circulated a memo to all Faculty Board members on October 26 detailing proposed revisions, and will be putting these changes forward for adoption at the November 27 Faculty Board meeting. The notable revisions include: addition of a clause that clarifies the responsibilities of Faculty Board; changes to student representation on Faculty Board committees; major revision to the terms of reference for the Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies (JCAS); deletion of two defunct standing committees; and a major overhaul of the formatting, numbering and general presentation of Sections and Clauses.

As a reminder, we are still looking for a Faculty Board Clerk for the remainder of this academic year. The Clerk is primarily responsible for keeping the meeting minutes, ensuring quorum, and working with the Secretary to organize committee elections in the spring. Please consider stepping forward to volunteer for this very important role.

# Report of the FPA Academic Policy and Curriculum Committee (APCC) 

Prepared for FPA Faculty Board Meeting of November 27, 2023 by Vandna Bhatia, Chair, APCC

The APCC has met three times since October 16, 2023, to review proposed undergraduate curricular changes for the 2024-25 Calendar. The committee is presenting 26 program and course change proposals for Faculty Board approval and recommendation, including 3 major modifications. A summary of the proposed modifications begins on the next page.

The Track A2 major modifications include two new concentrations in the Law and Legal Studies Department (see attached Executive Summary, attached, p. 4-7):
i. Concentration in Criminal Law and Social Order BA Honours (TBD-2222, attached, p. 8)
ii. Concentration in Criminal Law and Social Order BA Combined Honours (TBD-2224, attached, p. 12-15)

The new concentrations assemble existing courses in criminal law and social order, which are in high demand and popular with students, into a coherent bundle. The proposed concentrations build on the teaching and research strengths within the Department.

One Track B major modification is presented in the Bachelor's in Media Production and Design program. This is the addition of an alternative capstone course, MPAD 4906: Translational Approach to Indigenous Community Wellness (MPAD 4906, attached, p. 16-17). This course gives MPAD students an opportunity to work with students in FASS and with Indigenous communities to while completing their degree requirements.

Subject: Proposal for New BA Concentration (Criminal Law, Criminalization and Social Order) (Major Mod Track A2)

## Modification Description

The Law and Legal Studies department proposes to establish a new Concentration in Criminal Law, Criminalization and Social Order. The department currently offers three concentrations available to those enrolled in the BA Honours Law program:
(i) Business Law
(ii) Law, Policy and Government
(iii) Transnational Law and Human Rights

Concentrations are a very popular option within the Honours program with over 44\% of all BA Honours Law students electing to register in one of the existing concentrations.

This additional proposed concentration would address high student demand from existing and prospective students for a concentration focusing on the area of criminal law. We expect this new concentration to result in new enrollments and improved retention. A Concentration in Criminal Law, Criminalization and Social Order would showcase the existing depth of our faculty's research and expertise in this area, and a core area of teaching strength within the department.

We believe this concentration will attract students interested in exploring a wide range of future graduate and professional studies, as well as career opportunities that comprise, support, and challenge the broad field of criminal law and the criminal justice system in Canada.

## Law B.A. Honours with Concentration in Criminal Law, Criminalization and Social Order

Consistent with other concentrations in the Department of Law and Legal Studies, the proposed concentration is comprised of 5 credits. Students complete 1.0 mandatory 2000 -level credits and 1.5 mandatory credits in 3000-level and 4000-level courses. These "core" credits provide a foundation for the field and focus attention on dominant issues and debates whilst still providing a measure of flexibility and student choice. Students complete the remainder of their 2.5 credits from a list of approved courses at the 3000 and 4000-levels. 4000-level options include tutorials and research options through an Honours Research Paper.

As with other concentrations in the department, students must maintain a minimum CGPA of 6.50 over courses fulfilling the concentration to continue in their concentration.

## Impact on Other Programs

The addition of a new concentration within the BA Law program would be unlikely to have a significant impact on other programs within the Faculty. The proposed concentration does not require students to complete courses offered by other departments or draw on any other resources outside of the Department of Law and Legal Studies.

The concentration may attract a small number of students that might otherwise enroll in the BA CCJ. Presently CCJ students can complete their degree with a concentration in Law. The proposed concentration in Criminal Law, Criminalization and Social Order may attract some "BA Honours CCJ with a Concentration in Law" students who wish to prioritize the study of law as the primary focus of their degree, whilst still concentrating their studies in the area of criminal law and criminal justice. However, there may be an equal number of students drawn away from Law and Legal Studies to the new non-concentration pathway in the BA Honours CCJ.

## Societal Need

The department offers an interdisciplinary approach to the study of law and to the issues, institutions and personnel that broadly define, support, and enact the criminal justice system in Canada. A core advantage of the department's approach in this part of our program is that we provide students both with a firm understanding of foundational legal tools, terminology, and institutional frameworks, while crucially also providing students with a wide range of important critical resources to reflexively evaluate and challenge these same tools, terminology and frameworks.

Students that complete the BA Honours Law with the proposed concentration will be exceptionally wellpositioned to pursue graduate or professional qualifications (e.g. law school), as well as a range of diverse career paths including law enforcement, governmental policy work in the area of criminal law, correction services, non-profit and community-based organization groups operating within the field of the criminal justice, victim advocacy, restorative justice, court supports, etc.

In recent years the acute failures of the criminal justice system - especially in its encounters with Indigenous, and other marginalized or racialized individuals and communities - have become more widely acknowledged and condemned. Calls to reform core aspects and operations within criminal law and the criminal justice system are heard more loudly and frequently. Graduates with this concentration are well positioned to be important players in these new reform initiatives.

## Student Demand

The absence of a "criminal law concentration" is regularly highlighted by existing students in advising appointments with departmental advisors and is frequently identified as a "gap" in the department's concentrations by prospective students at recruiting events.

Presently, 27\% of all second-year BA Honours Law students elect to take both core 2000-level credits that will comprise the proposed concentration (LAWS 2301 - Criminal Justice System and LAWS 2302 Criminal Law) and the 3000- and 4000-level credits that will be included are some of the department's most consistently full course offerings.

Just over 30\% of the topics of Honours Research Papers undertaken in the department over the last 5 years reflect a focus on some aspect of criminal law and criminal justice issues. $\mathbf{4 0 \%}$ of all Service Placements undertaken in this period reflect this focus, as well.

Expanding concentration options in the BA Honours Law, and specifically offering a concentration focused on criminal law, also distinguishes Carleton from other universities offering similar "legal studies" or "law and society" programs in Ontario and across Canada. Competing BA Honours programs in "legal studies" or "law and society", such as those offered by the Universities of Waterloo, Laurier, McMaster, and York, do not offer formal specializations or concentration options within their undergraduate programs. Only Laurentian University and the Ontario Tech University (OTU) offer "specializations", with Laurentian offering a narrower BA in Criminal Justice (alongside their BA in Law and Justice) and OTU offering a BA Legal Studies with specializations in Human Rights, Alternative Dispute Resolution, and Information Law. The addition of this proposed concentration to the BA Honours Law will be a major competitive advantage to attract prospective students to Carleton. The new concentration will also allow our program to more effectively compete against Criminology programs that have positioned themselves as also engaging in "legal studies", such as the Department of Criminology and Socio-Legal Studies at the University of Toronto.

## Resources

As the proposed concentration effectively draws on existing departmental strengths, no new resources are required to support this proposal. The new concentration is well-supported by existing administrative resources, comprehensive course offerings, and the research and teaching focus of a significant number of the department's junior and senior faculty.

The proposed structure of the concentration and the fact that the concentration effectively "packages" regularly offered and well-subscribed courses, means that the department retains a high degree of flexibility in determining yearly course offering to support the concentration.

A significant portion of BA Honours Law students already elect to pursue one of the department's existing concentrations, administrative staff are well acquainted with these structures and able to meet any new administrative or advising demands from students seeking to enroll or navigate the new concentration.

The proposal will have no new library, equipment, space, or graduate student funding implications.

Summary We are looking to allow students to take NEUR 4906 Translational Approach to Indigenous Community Wellness instead of taking MPAD 4000: Capstone Projects, as their final thesis capstone course. This would be a very limited enrollment ie. 8 students (this is because there are students from BIOLOGY, NEUR, and ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCES also taking the course and it must be manageable for all). Essentially, instead of working in groups in MPAD 4000, two groups would work within this course.

Students in MPAD 4000 have had the option of working with Indigenous communities, alongside students in Neuroscience and Biology since 2021 by informally taking NEUR 4906 as a course, because their professor Dr. McKnight teaches MPAD 4000 and works alongside colleagues involved with the Indigenous youth storytelling project. This has been made possible since Dr. McKnight is a course coordinator for NEUR 4906 and has been able to support their students in their projects. However, because of the work load that is required to learn how to ethically and care-fully engage with Indigenous communities, students who are registered in MPAD 4000 and who take this route for their final capstone project, do extra work than other students. They do so by doing extra training, participate in workshops and guest speakers that go beyond MPAD 4000. By allowing students to take NEUR 4906 through a MPAD course code, they will be able to work with communities, complete a capstone project, without needing to take both courses (NEUR 4906 informally) at once. This gives students the rare and exceptional opportunity to work with communities while also completing their degree requirements.

The design of NEUR 4906 works in tandem with the requirements of MPAD 4000. Students will be required to work with groups with an organization, work on project management, produce a portfolio, tell a story, and create a multi-media project that will be exhibited to their peers and communities in April.

## Re: Proposed revisions to the FPA Constitution

At the request of FPA Faculty Board at its meeting of April 6, 2023, the Faculty Board Executive Committee established an ad hoc committee to review the process for electing student representatives to FPA Faculty Board committees and to bring forward any constitutional amendments for consideration. The chair of the ad hoc committee presented a report and recommendations at the October 16, 2023 Faculty Board meeting. I am now circulating the proposed constitutional revisions that follow from that report and the feedback received.

In addition, Faculty Board Executive has taken the opportunity to review the entire constitution for clarity, consistency, and alignment with current practice. This was last done in 2011. As a result, we are also proposing a number of amendments, both substantive and editorial/presentational.

Below is a summary table of the proposed revisions, followed by a more detailed explanation of and rationale for the substantive changes. A tracked-change version of the Constitution is appended to this memo. A "clean" revised version has been circulated by email along with this notice.

Note that the constitutional revisions approved by Faculty Board at the April meeting are still under review by the Senate Academic Governance Committee (SAGC) and have not yet been approved by Senate. Technically, our "old" Constitution (2019 version) is still in effect. The revisions being proposed here are to the latest April 2023 version.

## Detailed Explanation of Substantive Revisions

1. In Section I: addition of new Clause (I.5), specifying the responsibilities of Faculty Board.

Surprisingly, our constitution makes no direct reference to the functions and responsibilities of Faculty Board. Such a clause exists in other Faculty constitutions. We are proposing the addition of a new Clause (I.5) that makes explicit the responsibilities of Faculty Board that have up to now been largely implicit. These responsibilities reflect current practice, and are aligned with responsibilities of other Faculty Boards (the language proposed here was adapted from the FASS Faculty Board Constitution).
2. In Section III ("Committees"): revision to the Executive, Undergraduate and Graduate Curriculum Committee memberships (Clause III.1.i(b) and (c), III.2.i, and III.3.i) to reflect proposed new procedures for selecting student members.

The Ad Hoc Committee on Student Representation recommended that student members of Faculty Board committees be selected by FPA students, rather than elected by Faculty Board. In the ad hoc committee's report that was shared with Faculty Board last month, it was recommended that these positions default to the executive officers of the official student governance bodies (CASG and GSA).

After circulating the report, we received additional feedback from CASG, which noted that executive officers are elected by all Carleton students, and not exclusively by FPA students, so an FPA student elected as an executive officer may not necessarily have been elected by a majority of FPA students. As such, they asked that we simply leave the selection process up to the student government bodies, rather than designate ex officio positions. The GSA President concurred.

The proposed amendments (Clause III.1.i(b) and (c), III.2.i, and III.3.i) now specify that the student members of the Executive, Undergraduate and Graduate Curriculum Committees shall be selected by the official student government bodies. A new Clause (V.2.iv) clarifies that student members, unless otherwise stated, "shall be elected or appointed by the appropriate official student government body...according to its own procedures."
3. In Section III ("Committees"): deletion of Clause III. 7 ("The Public Affairs Research Centre (PARC) Committee").

The Public Affairs Research Centre (PARC) Committee has not met for many years and is essentially defunct. After consulting with the Associate Dean (Research and Graduate), it was agreed that there is little value in maintaining it as a standing committee of Faculty Board. We are proposing that it be removed from the Constitution.
4. In Section III ("Committees"): addition of a new Clause (III.9), clarifying ex officio membership on committees.

An ex officio committee member is a member by virtue of holding another office or position, rather than through an election or appointment. Unless otherwise indicated in bylaws, ex officio members enjoy the same responsibilities, privileges and voting rights as elected members. This has not always been understood and was not always reflected clearly in our Constitution. We have proposed a new Clause (III.9) that clarifies this.

In addition, we have identified two references to ex officio positions that are non-voting, as per current practice, but were not indicated as such in the Constitution: the registrarial representatives on the Undergraduate and Graduate Curriculum Committees. Clauses III.2.i(d) and III.3.i(d) have now been revised to reflect current practice.
5. In Section IV ("Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies"): revisions to align with current practice.

The Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies (JCAS) is the body that reviews applications for readmission to FPA or FASS degree programs after suspension, required withdrawal, or debarment. It is also an appeals body on matters pertaining to academic progression in and graduation from FPA and FASS degree programs. It normally meets monthly or when needed.

It was unclear whether the description of the committee, as stated in Section IV of the Constitution, accurately reflected current practice. Though it has a reporting requirement, neither FASS nor FPA Faculty Board has received any communication from the committee for many years. As such, the FASS Associate Dean (Faculty Affairs) and I met with the Director of Admissions to review the structure and operation of the committee. We have now revised the language to better align it with current practice.

In addition, we have proposed tightening up the requirements for recording committee deliberations and reporting to Faculty Board. We have also proposed relaxing the requirement for the Committee to appoint two co-chairs - one from each Faculty - in favour of alternating the position between Faculties every other year. We have also proposed removing the requirement to have each Faculty Board Executive approve the selection of committee chair.

## 6. Deletion of Section V ("The Joint BA Curriculum Committee").

The Joint BA Curriculum Committee is an historical holdover from when FPA (then PAM) was created and there was some concern about having the BA split across the two Faculties. That concern has proven to be unwarranted. Indeed, the committee has not met in many years and the current and longstanding practice, in which each Faculty runs its own curriculum committee that reviews its own BA programs, works effectively. We are proposing that this committee be removed from the Constitution.
7. In new Section V ("Elections"): Added a new Clause (V.2.iv) to clarify the student selection procedures.

See item 2 above.

## CONSTITUTION OF THE FACULTY OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS OF <br> CARLETON UNIVERSITY

The Faculty of Public Affairs brings together academic units to address the structures, processes, policies and interactions of the private, governmental and non-profit/volunteer sectors of civic society. The composition of the Faculty explicitly reflects Carleton's belief that public discourse about the issues facing Canada and the world is an integral part of building a strong society. Dedicated to the highest quality of teaching and research, both domestically and internationally, the Faculty supports individual, collaborative, disciplinary and multidisciplinary scholarship. It teaches new generations of students whose knowledge and skills will contribute to advancing public discourse and action. Taking advantage of its location in the nation's capital, the Faculty offers its expertise to governments at all levels, to organized groups, and to the community at large. Its goal is to reach beyond the campus and encourage students and faculty to learn from, and contribute to, public life in Canada and worldwide.

## I

## FACULTY AND FACULTY BOARD

I. 1 There shall be a unit of Carleton University called the Faculty of Public Affairs.
I. 2 The following departments, schools and institutes (hereinafter called "sub-units") shall form the Faculty of Public Affairs: Department of Economics; Department of Law and Legal Studies; Department of Political Science; Institute of Criminology and Criminal Justice; Institute of European, Russian and Eurasian Studies; Institute of Political Economy; Institute of African Studies; Norman Paterson School of International Affairs; School of Journalism and Communication; School of Public Policy and Administration; School of Social Work; Arthur Kroeger College of Public Affairs; and such other sub-units as may be approved by the University and accepted by Faculty Board.
I. 3 The plenary organ of the Faculty shall be the Public Affairs Faculty Board ("Faculty Board").

## I. 4 Faculty Board Membership

i. I. 3 Faculty Board shall consist of: the Dean, all professors, associate professors, assistant professors, full-time lecturers and instructors in all sub-units of the Faculty, and all student representatives elected to the Board of all sub-units in the Faculty in accordance with the provisions of the document known as the Academic Governance of the University (the "AGU"), all as voting members.
ii. There shall be one representative from each of the Faculty of Science, the Faculty of Engineering and Design, the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, the

Sprott School of Business and the Faculty of Graduate Studies and Postdoctoral Affairs, all as voting members.
iii. Faculty Board may invite representatives of other units and sub-units of the University to attend and participate in meetings of Faculty Board on such terms as Faculty Board may determine.
iv. The President of the University, the Vice-President (Academic) and Provost, the Vice-President (Research and International), the Dean of Graduate Studies and Postdoctoral Affairs, the Clerk of Senate and the University Registrar shall serve as non-voting members of Faculty Board.

## I. 5 Faculty Board Responsibilities

Unless otherwise determined by Senate, the Faculty Board shall:
i. consider and determine all courses of study for all degree, certificate, and diploma programs administered by the sub-units constituting the Faculty of Public Affairs as listed in I.2, for recommendation for approval by the Senate;
ii. recommend to the Senate the establishment, deletion or administrative reorganization of Centres, Colleges, Committees, Departments, Institutes, Offices and Schools, Chairs, or courses of instruction within the purview of the Faculty;
iii. receive and consider recommendations respecting academic matters from the sub-units constituting the Faculty of Public Affairs as listed in I.2;
iv. review and make recommendations to the Senate concerning general or Faculty regulations in the Calendar, specifically those governing admission, registration, examinations, academic standing, continuation, probation and graduation as they affect the degree, certificate, and diploma programs administered by the subunits constituting the Faculty of Public Affairs as listed in I.2;
v. recommend to the Senate the granting of degrees, certificates and diplomas that fall within its purview.
vi. make such recommendations to the Dean of the Faculty or to the Senate as the Board may deem proper for achieving the objects and purposes of the University.

## I. 6 Faculty Board Meetings

i. I.4Except as may otherwise be determined by Faculty Board, meetings of Faculty Board shall be open to all members of the Carleton University
community. Faculty Board may, on 48 hours notice, close a meeting to any or all categories of spectators in accordance with the provisions of the AGU document. Student members of Faculty Board shall not participate in meetings or parts of meetings in which individual student cases are discussed.
ii. I.5The Board shall meet at the call of its Executive or within 15 working days of the written request of 12 of its voting members.
iii. I.6A quorum at all meetings of Faculty Board shall consist of 15 voting members of Faculty Board including at least one member from at least 5 subunits, provided that at least $51 \%$ of those in attendance at any meeting of Faculty Board shall be faculty members of sub-units in the Faculty as identified in Clause I. 2 above.
iv. I.7By October 1 of each year, the Committee of Chairs and Directors will provide to the Secretary of Faculty Board a list of two members of each sub-unit who have been given as part of their normal duties attendance at Faculty Board Meetings.
v. I. 8 Meetings of Faculty Board shall be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order and Procedure (to the extent that those Rules are not inconsistent with this Constitution) and such bylaws as may be adopted by Faculty Board. Except as otherwise provided for in this Constitution, notices of meetings with agenda and all relevant documentation shall be circulated to members of Faculty Board at least 5 working days in advance of its meetings.

## II <br> OFFICERS

## II. 1 The Dean of the Faculty of Public Affairs

i. $\quad 4.1$ The Senior administrative officer of the Faculty shall have the Title "Dean of the Faculty of Public Affairs."
ii. H.1.iThe Dean of the Faculty is an Officer of the University and is appointed in accordance with the document called "Guidelines on the Appointment by the President of Senior Academic Administrators," passed by the Board of Governors of the University, or any document in substitution therefor.
iii. H.1.iiIn reporting to the Vice-President (Academic) and Provost, the Dean leads the Faculty with respect to curriculum development, teaching, learning, research, and fostering its best interests. The Dean represents the Faculty and acts on its behalf in any administrative and ceremonial matters pertaining to the Faculty as a whole. The Dean manages the Faculty, including matters relating
to resourcing, resource allocation and Faculty development with advice from the Committee of Chairs and Directors and other relevant committees and performs such other duties or functions as required for the academic program of the Faculty.

## II. 2 The Associate and Assistant Deans

i. II.1.iiiAssociate Deans are appointed by the President in accordance with the document called "Guidelines on the Appointment by the President of Senior Academic Administrators," passed by the Board of Governors of the University, or any document in substitution therefor. Assistant Deans are appointed by the Dean on such terms and conditions as the Dean shall determine.
ii. H.1.ivAssociate Deans and Assistant Deans report to the Dean and, in the absence of the Dean or on other occasions as directed by the Dean, may exercise the full powers of the Dean.

## II. 3 The Secretary of Faculty Board

i. H.2.iPursuant to the provisions of Clause Vł. 1 below, Faculty Board shall elect one of its voting faculty members as Secretary for a term of three years beginning on the first day of July next following the election.
ii. $\quad$.2.iiThe duties of the Secretary shall consist of:
a) calling and chairing meetings of Faculty Board and of the Executive Committee;
b) representing the Faculty as a member of the University Senate, and reporting recommendations of Faculty Board to Senate;
c) reporting relevant proceedings of Senate to Faculty Board;
d) serving as electoral officer of Faculty Board;
e) such other duties as may be assigned to the Secretary by this Constitution or bylaws or resolutions of Faculty Board.

## II.4. The Clerk of Faculty Board

i. II.3.iPursuant to the provisions of Clause VI. 1 below, Faculty Board shall elect one of its voting faculty members as Clerk for a term of three years beginning on the first day of July next following the election.
ii. I.3.iiThe duties of the Clerk shall consist of:
a) giving notice of and recording the proceedings of Faculty Board meetings and keeping the attendance roll;
b) giving notice of and recording proceedings of Executive Committee meetings;
c) carrying out the duties of the Secretary of Faculty Board in the Secretary's absence;
d) such other duties as may be assigned to the Clerk by this Constitution or bylaws or resolutions of Faculty Board.

## III <br> COMMITTEES

## III. 1 Executive Committee

i. Membership
III.1.ii- The Committee shall consist of:
a) the Dean, the Associate Deans, the Assistant Deans, the Secretary of Faculty Board and the Clerk of Faculty Board, as ex officio members, and
b) one FPA undergraduate student selected by the Carleton Academic Student Government (CASG) as per Clause V.2.iv below for a one-year term beginning immediately upon their selection,
c) one FPA graduate student selected by the Graduate Student Association (GSA) as per Clause V.2.iv below for a one-year term beginning immediately upon their selection, and
d) as many as two FPA faculty members and one student member elected by Faculty Board pursuant to the provisions of Clause Vł. 2 below for a one-_ year term beginning on the first day of July next following the election.
ii. Mandate
\#.1.i-The Executive Committee shall:
a) plan the forthcoming business of Faculty Board and arrange the agenda of its meetings;
b) act on behalf of Faculty Board between meetings of Faculty Board;
c) scrutinize and approve-affirm lists of proposed graduates of programmes offered in the Faculty as such may be presented to members of the Executive Committee by the office of the University Registrar;
d) report all decisions taken by the Committee under b) and c) above to Faculty Board at its next regularly called meeting.
iii. Meetings
a) HI.1.iii The Secretary of Faculty Board shall act as Chair of the Executive Committee and shall call its meetings.
b) Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Executive Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Executive Committee.

## III. 2 Undergraduate Curriculum Committee

i. Membership
III.2.i The Undergraduate Curriculum Committee shall consist of:
a) the undergraduate program coordinators from each of the sub-units of the Faculty, the University Registrar (or the Registrar's designate),
b) the Associate Dean with responsibility for undergraduate academic affairs in the Faculty, and the Secretary of Faculty Board, as ex officio members, and
c) one FPA student selected by CASG as per Clause V.2.iv below for a oneyear term beginning immediately upon their selection, one student member elected by Faculty Board purstant to the provisions of Clause VI. 2 below for a one year term beginning on the first day of July next following the election. -And
d) the University Registrar (or the Registrar's designate) as ex officio (nonvoting) member.
The chair of the Committee will be the Associate Dean (Academic). Meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee.
ii. Mandate
III.2.ii The Committee shall:
a) receive, review and initiate proposals for undergraduate course changes and additions and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning major and minor modifications to undergraduate courses and programs;
b) receive and review proposals and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning the courses in proposed undergraduate certificate, diploma and degree programs;
c) review and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning general or faculty regulations in the undergraduate Calendar, specifically those governing admission, registration, examinations, academic standing, promotion and graduation;
d) review and comment on all proposed regulations originating outside the Committee that affect the academic progress of undergraduates in the Faculty;
e) consult with other Faculties concerning combined undergraduate programs or regulations affecting students in the Faculty;
iii. Meetings
a) The Associate Dean (Academic) shall chair the Committee and shall call its meetings. The chair of the Committee will be the Associate Dean (Academic).
b) Meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee.
iv. III.2.iii Departmental recommendations for changes in curriculum and regulations governing undergraduate programs for the next academic year shall be submitted to the Committee by a date to be specified by the Committee in consultation with the Secretary of Faculty Board. The Committee shall present its recommendations and copies of the departmental submissions to Faculty Board for approval.

## III. 3 Graduate Curriculum Committee

i. Membership
III.3.i The Graduate Curriculum Committee shall consist of:
a) at least one graduate program coordinator from each of the sub-units of the Faculty, the Graduate Registrar (or the Registrar's designate),
b) the Associate Dean with responsibility for graduate academic affairs in the Faculty and the Secretary of Faculty Board, as ex officio members,
c) one FPA graduate student member selected by the GSA as per Clause V.2.iv below for a one-year term beginning immediately following their selection, and ene graduate student member elected by Faculty Board purstant to the provisions of Clause VI. 2 below for a one-year term beginning on the first day of July next following the election.
d) the Graduate Registrar (or the Registrar's designate) as ex officio (nonvoting) member.
The chair of the Committee will be the Associate Dean (Academic). Meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee.
ii. Mandate
III.3.iiThe Committee shall:
a) receive, review and initiate proposals for graduate course changes and additions and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning major and minor modifications to graduate courses and programs;
b) receive and review proposals and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning the courses in proposed graduate certificate, diploma and degree programs;
c) review and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning general or Faculty regulations in the Graduate Calendar, specifically those governing admission, registration, examinations, academic standing, promotion and graduation;
d) review and comment on all proposed regulations originating outside the Committee that affect the academic progress of graduate students in the Faculty;
e) consult with other Faculties concerning combined graduate programs or regulations affecting students in the Faculty;

## iii. Meetings

a. The Associate Dean (Academic) shall chair the Committee and shall call its meetings. The chair of the Committee will be the Associate Dean (Academic).
b. Meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee
iv. III.3.iii-Departmental recommendations for changes in curriculum and regulations governing graduate programs for the next academic year shall be submitted to the Committee by a date to be specified by the Committee in consultation with the Secretary of Faculty Board. The Committee shall present its recommendations and copies of the departmental submissions to Faculty Board for approval.

## III. 4 Promotion and Tenure Committee

i. Membership
a) III.4.iiThe Committee shall consist of: the Dean, the Chair of each sub-unit in the Faculty, and one additional faculty member from each sub-unit in the Faculty selected in accordance with procedures adopted by each subunit. The Dean shall act as Chair and call meetings of the Committee. The Dean may, from time to time, invite appropriate $\Lambda$ ssociate Dean(s) to assist in committee deliberations in an ex officio (non-voting) manner.

Otherwise, meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee.
ii. Mandate
\#I.4.i The Promotion and Tenure Committee shall:
a) receive all sub-unit Promotion and Tenure Committee recommendations concerning promotions, tenure and confirmation, together with such additional submissions as are provided for in various University documents;
b) advise the Dean concerning the recommendations; and
c) in the case of each candidate for promotion, transmit its recommendations to the University Committee on Promotions through the Dean along with the recommendations made by sub-units, all relevant supporting documents, and any subsequent comments submitted by sub-units.
iii. Meetings
a) The Dean shall act as Chair and shall call meetings of the Committee.
b) The Dean may, from time to time, invite appropriate Associate Dean(s) to assist in committee deliberations in an ex officio (_non-voting_) mannercapacity. Otherwise, meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee.

## III. 5 Committee of Chairs and Directors

i. Membership
a) III.5.2 The Committee shall be composed of the Dean, the Associate Deans, the Assistant Deans, the executive assistant to the Dean, the ODFPA Managers and Team Leads, and the Chairs or Directors (as the case may be) of all sub-units in the Faculty (which, in the case of the School of Journalism and Communication, shall be deemed to include both the Director and the Associate Director). The Dean shall act as Chair and eall meetings of the Committee. Meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee.
ii. Mandate
\#I.5.4The Chairs and Directors of the Faculty shall meet at the call of the Dean:
a) to consider various administrative matters;
b) to advise the Dean in requesting and allocating funds, personnel, appointments and facilities insofar as these affect the academic programs of the Faculty;
c) to assist in the formation and implementation of long-range plans for the development and maintenance of all academic programs within the Faculty;
d) to advise on enrollments in these programs;
e) to advise on issues of student retention and student success; and
f) to advise the Dean on such other matters and to undertake such other duties as the Dean may request.
iii. Meetings
a) The Dean shall act as Chair and call meetings of the Committee.
b) Meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee.

## III. 6 Research Committee

i. Membership
a) II.6.ii The Committee shall be composed of the Dean, the Associate Dean with responsibility for research in the Faculty, one representative from each sub-unit of the Faculty (chosen by the Chair of the Committee and the unit Chair or Director), and such other members of Faculty as may be invited to participate by the Chair of the Committee.
ii. Mandate
a) III.6.i The Research Committee considers issues relating to the promotion and conduct of research in the Faculty, and makes such recommendations as it considers appropriate.
b) H.6.iv The Committee reports to Faculty Board through the Chair of the Committee.
iii. Meetings
a) III.6.iii-The Associate Dean acts as chair, and calls meetings of the Committee.

HI. 7 The Public Affairs Research Centre (PARC) Committee

HI.7.i The PARC Committee considers issues relating to the research centres (both Public Affairs Research Centres and Carleton University Research Centres) located in the Faculty of Public Affairs, and makes such recommendations as it considers appropriate.
II.7.ii The PARC Committee shall be composed of the Dean, the Associate Dean with responsibility for research in the Faculty, and one representative from each research centre located in the Faculty as designated by the researeh centre.

HI.7.iii The Associate Dean acts as chair, and calls meetings of the PARC Committee.
III.7.iv The PARC Committee reports to Faculty Board through the Chair of the Committee.

## III. 78 The FPA Computing Committee

i. Membership
a) II.8.iiThe FPA Computing Committee shall consist of one representative from each of the Department of Economics, the Department of Law and Legal Studies, the Department of Political Science, the School of Public Policy and Administration, the Norman Paterson School of International Affairs, the School of Social Work, and the School of Journalism and Communication, together with the Faculty Computing Analyst.
ii. Mandate
a) III.8.iThe FPA Computing Committee considers issues relating to all aspects of academic computing, providing advice to both the Dean of the Faculty and to members of faculty across the University, and liaising with the Academic Computing Committee of the University.
b) H. ${ }^{\text {b }}$.ivThe FPA Computing Committee reports to Faculty Board through the Chair of the Committee.
iii. Meetings
a) III.8.iii One of the members of the FPA Computing Committee who is also a member of Faculty shall be selected by the FPA Computing Committee to act as chair, and shall call meetings of the FPA Computing Committee as may be necessary.

## III. 89 Ad Hoc Committees

i. Faculty Board shall be entitled to establish such other standing or ad hoc committees as it sees fit, to determine the composition and terms of reference of such committees, and to appoint the initial members of such committees, provided that
a) no such committee shall remain a committee of Faculty Board for more than two years from the date of the meeting of Faculty Board at which it was established unless its composition and terms of reference are incorporated in this Constitution; and
b) all elections subsequently necessary to fill positions on such committees are held pursuant to the provisions of Clause Vł. 2 below

## III. 9 Ex Officio Members

i. Unless otherwise stated, ex officio members of the above Committees shall have full voting rights and responsibilities.

## IV <br> JOINT COMMITTEE ON ADMISSIONS AND STUDIES (JCAS)

## IV. 1 Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies (JCAS)

i. Membership

The Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies shall consist of:
a) four faculty members, two from the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (as defined in its Constitution) and two from the Faculty of Public Affairs nominated by the Executive Committee of the appropriate Faculty Boards, to serve a three-year term, renewable;
b) two alternate faculty members, one from each Faculty Board, nominated by the appropriate Faculty Board Executive Committees in the manner described in IV.1.i.a for a three-year period, who will be called upon to replace regular members who are unable to attend;
c) The Undergraduate Program Co-ordinator, Faculty of Arts and Social Seiences, one Admissions Officer and one representative from the Registrar's Office as ex officio and non-voting members.
d) Terms of Office will normally commence July $1^{\text {st }}$.
ii. Officers
a) The Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies shall select a nominate two co-e Chairs from among its membership, one from each Faculty Board, to a non-renewable term of not more than for a term of two years, to be
approved by the Executive Committees of both Faculties. The position of Chair shall alternate between the two Faculties.
b) The Admissions Officer representative shall maintain a record of all meetings and committee decisions
iii. _Mandate/Terms of Reference

The Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies shall:
a) The Committee shall-hear and decide petitions and appeals concerning the interpretation of, exceptions to, or administrative application of academic regulations affecting the admission and academic progress and graduation of undergraduate students registered in B.A. programmesundergraduate programs in either the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, the Faculty of Public Affairs, or both-;
b) The Committee shall actively monitor the whole body of academic regulations governing the admission and academic regulations, progress, academic standing andgraduation of specific to undergraduate students programs registered or intended to be registered in B.A. programmes in either the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, the Faculty of Public Affairs, or both, and make recommendations to the relevant Faculty Boards regarding regulatory change when needed-;
c) prior to the start of each Fall term The committee shall present a report on its activities directly submit to both Faculty Boards each academic year, and shall make recommendations regarding regulatory change when neededa report on its activities covering the prior academic year.
iv. Meetings
a) The Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies shall meet as required to consider petitions in a timely fashion.
b) The Committee will decide its own quorum rule, but it is recommended that the quorum be the Chair and two faculty representatives.
V.

JOINT B.A. CURRICULUM COMMHTTEE
V. 1 Joint B.A. Curriculum Committee
V.1.i The Joint B.A. Curriculum Committee will consist of:
a) Four faculty members from the B.A. granting units in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences who are also members of the Academic Planning and Curriculum Committee in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences;
b) Four faculty members from the B.A. granting units in the Faculty of Public Affairs who are members of and appointed by the Academic Planning and Curriculum Committee of the Faculty of Public Affairs.
c) An Associate Dean from the Faculty of Arts and Social Science;
d) An Associate Dean from the Faculty of Public Affairs;
e) One student representative from each of the two Faculties (selected by the relevant APCC if more than one is eligible);
f) The University Registrar (or alternate, as designated by the University Registrar).
V. 2 Officers
i. The Committee shall be co-chaired by an Associate Dean from FASS and Public Affairs.
V. 3 Mandate/Terms of Reference
i. The Committee shall review and make recommendations for the next Calendar year for changes in B.A. degree regulations;
ii. The Committee shall consult with other Faculties concerning combined programs affecting B.A. students in the Faculties of Arts and Social Sciences and Public Affairs.
V. 4 Submissions:
i. The Faculty APCC shall forward B.A. degree regulation submissions to the Joint Committee by a date specified by the Joint B.A. Curriculum Committee in consultation with the Secretaries of the two Faculty Boards.
V. 5 Recommendations:
i. The Committee shall present its recommendations to the Faculty Board of Arts and Social Sciences and to the Faculty Board of Public Affairs for action at times appropriate to meet Senate deadlines.

## V <br> ELECTIONS

VI. 1 Election of Secretary and Clerk of Faculty Board
i. Except as otherwise provided for in valid University or Senate documents, the election of the Secretary and the Clerk of Faculty Board shall take place during April on a date (the "Election Date") assigned by the Executive Committee, and shall be conducted in accordance with the following procedures:
a) Not less than four weeks prior to the Election Date, the Executive Committee shall circulate to members of Faculty Board a call for nominations to be received in the office of the Clerk of Faculty Board not later than two weeks prior to the Election Date.
b) All nominations submitted pursuant to paragraph VI.1.i(a) shall be signed by three faculty members of Faculty Board and the nominee.
c) The Secretary shall call a meeting of Faculty Board for the Election Date, and in issuing that call shall append a list of those nominated pursuant to paragraph VI.1.i(a).
d) The Secretary and the Clerk shall be elected from among the nominees listed pursuant to paragraph VI.1.i(c) by a simple majority of the votes cast at the meeting of Faculty Board referred to in that paragraph.
ii. _The office of Secretary or Clerk (as the case may be) shall be deemed to be vacated should the incumbent be absent from the University for longer than six consecutive months.
iii. Should the office of Secretary or Clerk (as the case may be) become vacant for any reason whatsoever, then the remaining members of the Executive Committee shall appoint another faculty member of Faculty Board to serve in that office until a replacement is elected in accordance with the provisions of sub-Clause Vł.1.i. Such election shall be held in the April next following the creation of the vacancy.

## Vł. 2 Election of Members of Committees of Faculty Board

i. Except as otherwise provided for in valid University or Senate documents, wherever in this Constitution it is provided that members of committees of Faculty Board shall be elected, then such election shall take place during April at a meeting (the "Meeting") of Faculty Board, and shall be conducted in accordance with the following procedures:
a) Not less than four weeks prior to the Meeting, the Executive Committee shall circulate to members of Faculty Board a call for nominations to be received in the office of the Clerk of Faculty Board not later than two weeks prior to the Meeting.
b) All nominations submitted pursuant to paragraph VI.2.i(a) shall be signed by one member of Faculty Board and the nominee.
c) With notice of the Meeting, the Executive Committee shall circulate a list of nominees to elected positions on committees of Faculty Board.
d) Elected members of committees of Faculty Board shall be elected from among the nominees listed pursuant to paragraph Vł.2.i(c) by a simple majority of the votes cast at the Meeting.
ii. Any elected member of a committee of Faculty Board shall be deemed to have vacated the position should the incumbent be absent from the University for longer than six consecutive months.
iii. Should a vacancy occur for any reason whatsoever in any elected position on a committee of Faculty Board, then the remaining members of that committee shall appoint another member to serve in that position until a replacement is elected in accordance with the provisions of sub-Clause VI.2.i. Such election shall be held in the April next following the creation of the vacancy.
iv. Except as otherwise indicated, all FPA student members of Faculty Board committees shall be elected or appointed by the appropriate official student government body - the Carleton Student Government Association (CASG) or Graduate Student Association (GSA) - as required, according to its own procedures.

## VH BYLAWS AND CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

## VIt. 1 Bylaws

Bylaws of Faculty Board shall be adopted by a simple majority of the votes cast at a duly constituted meeting of Faculty Board at which a quorum is present. Notice of proposed amendment, repeal or adoption of bylaws must be given in writing not less than 30 days prior to the meeting at which those proposals are intended to be considered.

## VII. 2 Constitutional Amendments

This Constitution may be adopted or amended by a vote of $2 / 3$ of the votes cast at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Faculty Board at which a quorum is present. Notice of proposed constitutional amendments must be given in writing not less than 30 days prior to the meeting at which those proposals are intended to be considered.

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## CONSTITUTION OF THE FACULTY OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS OF <br> CARLETON UNIVERSITY

The Faculty of Public Affairs brings together academic units to address the structures, processes, policies and interactions of the private, governmental and non-profit/volunteer sectors of civic society. The composition of the Faculty explicitly reflects Carleton's belief that public discourse about the issues facing Canada and the world is an integral part of building a strong society. Dedicated to the highest quality of teaching and research, both domestically and internationally, the Faculty supports individual, collaborative, disciplinary and multidisciplinary scholarship. It teaches new generations of students whose knowledge and skills will contribute to advancing public discourse and action. Taking advantage of its location in the nation's capital, the Faculty offers its expertise to governments at all levels, to organized groups, and to the community at large. Its goal is to reach beyond the campus and encourage students and faculty to learn from, and contribute to, public life in Canada and worldwide.

## I

## FACULTY AND FACULTY BOARD

I. 1 There shall be a unit of Carleton University called the Faculty of Public Affairs.
I. 2 The following departments, schools and institutes (hereinafter called "sub-units") shall form the Faculty of Public Affairs: Department of Economics; Department of Law and Legal Studies; Department of Political Science; Institute of Criminology and Criminal Justice; Institute of European, Russian and Eurasian Studies; Institute of Political Economy; Institute of African Studies; Norman Paterson School of International Affairs; School of Journalism and Communication; School of Public Policy and Administration; School of Social Work; Arthur Kroeger College of Public Affairs; and such other sub-units as may be approved by the University and accepted by Faculty Board.
I. 3 The plenary organ of the Faculty shall be the Public Affairs Faculty Board ("Faculty Board").

## I. $4 \quad$ Faculty Board Membership

i. Faculty Board shall consist of: the Dean, all professors, associate professors, assistant professors, full-time lecturers and instructors in all sub-units of the Faculty, and all student representatives elected to the Board of all sub-units in the Faculty in accordance with the provisions of the document known as the Academic Governance of the University (the "AGU"), all as voting members.
ii. There shall be one representative from each of the Faculty of Science, the Faculty of Engineering and Design, the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, the

Sprott School of Business and the Faculty of Graduate Studies and Postdoctoral Affairs, all as voting members.
iii. Faculty Board may invite representatives of other units and sub-units of the University to attend and participate in meetings of Faculty Board on such terms as Faculty Board may determine.
iv. The President of the University, the Vice-President (Academic) and Provost, the Vice-President (Research and International), the Dean of Graduate Studies and Postdoctoral Affairs, the Clerk of Senate and the University Registrar shall serve as non-voting members of Faculty Board.

## I. $5 \quad$ Faculty Board Responsibilities

Unless otherwise determined by Senate, the Faculty Board shall:
i. consider and determine all courses of study for all degree, certificate, and diploma programs administered by the sub-units constituting the Faculty of Public Affairs as listed in I.2, for recommendation for approval by the Senate;
ii. recommend to the Senate the establishment, deletion or administrative reorganization of Centres, Colleges, Committees, Departments, Institutes, Offices and Schools, Chairs, or courses of instruction within the purview of the Faculty;
iii. receive and consider recommendations respecting academic matters from the sub-units constituting the Faculty of Public Affairs as listed in I.2;
iv. review and make recommendations to the Senate concerning general or Faculty regulations in the Calendar, specifically those governing admission, registration, examinations, academic standing, continuation, probation and graduation as they affect the degree, certificate, and diploma programs administered by the subunits constituting the Faculty of Public Affairs as listed in I.2;
v. recommend to the Senate the granting of degrees, certificates and diplomas that fall within its purview.
vi. make such recommendations to the Dean of the Faculty or to the Senate as the Board may deem proper for achieving the objects and purposes of the University.

## I. $6 \quad$ Faculty Board Meetings

i. Except as may otherwise be determined by Faculty Board, meetings of Faculty Board shall be open to all members of the Carleton University community.

Faculty Board may, on 48 hours notice, close a meeting to any or all categories of spectators in accordance with the provisions of the AGU document. Student members of Faculty Board shall not participate in meetings or parts of meetings in which individual student cases are discussed.
ii. The Board shall meet at the call of its Executive or within 15 working days of the written request of 12 of its voting members.
iii. A quorum at all meetings of Faculty Board shall consist of 15 voting members of Faculty Board including at least one member from at least 5 sub-units, provided that at least $51 \%$ of those in attendance at any meeting of Faculty Board shall be faculty members of sub-units in the Faculty as identified in Clause I. 2 above.
iv. By October 1 of each year, the Committee of Chairs and Directors will provide to the Secretary of Faculty Board a list of two members of each sub-unit who have been given as part of their normal duties attendance at Faculty Board Meetings.
v. Meetings of Faculty Board shall be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order and Procedure (to the extent that those Rules are not inconsistent with this Constitution) and such bylaws as may be adopted by Faculty Board. Except as otherwise provided for in this Constitution, notices of meetings with agenda and all relevant documentation shall be circulated to members of Faculty Board at least 5 working days in advance of its meetings.

## II <br> OFFICERS

## II. 1 The Dean of the Faculty of Public Affairs

i. The Senior administrative officer of the Faculty shall have the Title "Dean of the Faculty of Public Affairs."
ii. The Dean of the Faculty is an Officer of the University and is appointed in accordance with the document called "Guidelines on the Appointment by the President of Senior Academic Administrators," passed by the Board of Governors of the University, or any document in substitution therefor.
iii. In reporting to the Vice-President (Academic) and Provost, the Dean leads the Faculty with respect to curriculum development, teaching, learning, research, and fostering its best interests. The Dean represents the Faculty and acts on its behalf in any administrative and ceremonial matters pertaining to the Faculty as a whole. The Dean manages the Faculty, including matters relating to
resourcing, resource allocation and Faculty development with advice from the Committee of Chairs and Directors and other relevant committees and performs such other duties or functions as required for the academic program of the Faculty.

## II. 2 The Associate and Assistant Deans

i. Associate Deans are appointed by the President in accordance with the document called "Guidelines on the Appointment by the President of Senior Academic Administrators," passed by the Board of Governors of the University, or any document in substitution therefor. Assistant Deans are appointed by the Dean on such terms and conditions as the Dean shall determine.
ii. Associate Deans and Assistant Deans report to the Dean and, in the absence of the Dean or on other occasions as directed by the Dean, may exercise the full powers of the Dean.

## II. 3 The Secretary of Faculty Board

i. Pursuant to the provisions of Clause V. 1 below, Faculty Board shall elect one of its voting faculty members as Secretary for a term of three years beginning on the first day of July next following the election.
ii. The duties of the Secretary shall consist of:
a) calling and chairing meetings of Faculty Board and of the Executive Committee;
b) representing the Faculty as a member of the University Senate, and reporting recommendations of Faculty Board to Senate;
c) reporting relevant proceedings of Senate to Faculty Board;
d) serving as electoral officer of Faculty Board;
e) such other duties as may be assigned to the Secretary by this Constitution or bylaws or resolutions of Faculty Board.

## II.4. The Clerk of Faculty Board

i. Pursuant to the provisions of Clause VI. 1 below, Faculty Board shall elect one of its voting faculty members as Clerk for a term of three years beginning on the first day of July next following the election.
ii. The duties of the Clerk shall consist of:
a) giving notice of and recording the proceedings of Faculty Board meetings and keeping the attendance roll;
b) giving notice of and recording proceedings of Executive Committee meetings;
c) carrying out the duties of the Secretary of Faculty Board in the Secretary's absence;
d) such other duties as may be assigned to the Clerk by this Constitution or bylaws or resolutions of Faculty Board.

## III <br> COMMITTEES

## III. 1 Executive Committee

i. Membership

The Committee shall consist of:
a) the Dean, the Associate Deans, the Assistant Deans, the Secretary of Faculty Board and the Clerk of Faculty Board, as ex officio members,
b) one FPA undergraduate student selected by the Carleton Academic Student Government (CASG) as per Clause V.2.iv below for a one-year term beginning immediately upon their selection,
c) one FPA graduate student selected by the Graduate Student Association (GSA) as per Clause V.2.iv below for a one-year term beginning immediately upon their selection, and
d) as many as two FPA faculty members elected by Faculty Board pursuant to the provisions of Clause V. 2 below for a one-year term beginning on the first day of July next following the election.
ii. Mandate

The Executive Committee shall:
a) plan the forthcoming business of Faculty Board and arrange the agenda of its meetings;
b) act on behalf of Faculty Board between meetings of Faculty Board;
c) scrutinize and affirm lists of proposed graduates of programs offered in the Faculty as such may be presented to members of the Executive Committee by the office of the University Registrar;
d) report all decisions taken by the Committee under b) and c) above to Faculty Board at its next regularly called meeting.
iii. Meetings
a) The Secretary of Faculty Board shall act as Chair of the Executive Committee and shall call its meetings.
b) Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Executive Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Executive Committee.

## III. 2 Undergraduate Curriculum Committee

i. Membership

The Undergraduate Curriculum Committee shall consist of:
a) the undergraduate program coordinators from each of the sub-units of the Faculty,
b) the Associate Dean with responsibility for undergraduate academic affairs in the Faculty and the Secretary of Faculty Board, as ex officio members,
c) one FPA student selected by CASG as per Clause V.2.iv below for a oneyear term beginning immediately upon their selection, And
d) the University Registrar (or the Registrar's designate) as ex officio (nonvoting) member.
ii. Mandate

The Committee shall:
a) receive, review and initiate proposals for undergraduate course changes and additions and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning major and minor modifications to undergraduate courses and programs;
b) receive and review proposals and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning the courses in proposed undergraduate certificate, diploma and degree programs;
c) review and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning general or faculty regulations in the undergraduate Calendar, specifically those governing admission, registration, examinations, academic standing, promotion and graduation;
d) review and comment on all proposed regulations originating outside the Committee that affect the academic progress of undergraduates in the Faculty;
e) consult with other Faculties concerning combined undergraduate programs or regulations affecting students in the Faculty;
iii. Meetings
a) The Associate Dean (Academic) shall chair the Committee and shall call its meetings.
b) Meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee.
iv. Departmental recommendations for changes in curriculum and regulations governing undergraduate programs for the next academic year shall be submitted to the Committee by a date to be specified by the Committee in consultation with the Secretary of Faculty Board. The Committee shall present its recommendations and copies of the departmental submissions to Faculty Board for approval.

## III. 3 Graduate Curriculum Committee

## i. Membership

The Graduate Curriculum Committee shall consist of:
a) at least one graduate program coordinator from each of the sub-units of the Faculty,
b) the Associate Dean with responsibility for graduate academic affairs in the Faculty and the Secretary of Faculty Board, as ex officio members,
c) one FPA graduate student member selected by the GSA as per Clause V.2.iv below for a one-year term beginning immediately following their selection, and
d) the Graduate Registrar (or the Registrar's designate) as ex officio (nonvoting) member.
ii. Mandate

The Committee shall:
a) receive, review and initiate proposals for graduate course changes and additions and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning major and minor modifications to graduate courses and programs;
b) receive and review proposals and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning the courses in proposed graduate certificate, diploma and degree programs;
c) review and make recommendations to Faculty Board concerning general or Faculty regulations in the Graduate Calendar, specifically those governing admission, registration, examinations, academic standing, promotion and graduation;
d) review and comment on all proposed regulations originating outside the Committee that affect the academic progress of graduate students in the Faculty;
e) consult with other Faculties concerning combined graduate programs or regulations affecting students in the Faculty;
iii. Meetings
a. The Associate Dean (Academic) shall chair the Committee and shall call its meetings.
b. Meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee
iv. Departmental recommendations for changes in curriculum and regulations governing graduate programs for the next academic year shall be submitted to the Committee by a date to be specified by the Committee in consultation with the Secretary of Faculty Board. The Committee shall present its recommendations and copies of the departmental submissions to Faculty Board for approval.

## III. 4 Promotion and Tenure Committee

i. Membership
a) The Committee shall consist of: the Dean, the Chair of each sub-unit in the Faculty, and one additional faculty member from each sub-unit in the Faculty selected in accordance with procedures adopted by each sub-unit.
ii. Mandate

The Promotion and Tenure Committee shall:
a) receive all sub-unit Promotion and Tenure Committee recommendations concerning promotions, tenure and confirmation, together with such additional submissions as are provided for in various University documents;
b) advise the Dean concerning the recommendations; and
c) in the case of each candidate for promotion, transmit its recommendations to the University Committee on Promotions through the Dean along with the recommendations made by sub-units, all relevant supporting documents, and any subsequent comments submitted by sub-units.
iii. Meetings
a) The Dean shall act as Chair and shall call meetings of the Committee.
b) The Dean may, from time to time, invite appropriate Associate Dean(s) to assist in committee deliberations in a non-voting capacity. Otherwise,
meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee.

## III. 5 Committee of Chairs and Directors

i. Membership
a) The Committee shall be composed of the Dean, the Associate Deans, the Assistant Deans, the executive assistant to the Dean, the ODFPA Managers and Team Leads, and the Chairs or Directors (as the case may be) of all sub-units in the Faculty (which, in the case of the School of Journalism and Communication, shall be deemed to include both the Director and the Associate Director).
ii. Mandate

The Chairs and Directors of the Faculty shall meet at the call of the Dean:
a) to consider various administrative matters;
b) to advise the Dean in requesting and allocating funds, personnel, appointments and facilities insofar as these affect the academic programs of the Faculty;
c) to assist in the formation and implementation of long-range plans for the development and maintenance of all academic programs within the Faculty;
d) to advise on enrollments in these programs;
e) to advise on issues of student retention and student success; and
f) to advise the Dean on such other matters and to undertake such other duties as the Dean may request.
iii. Meetings
a) The Dean shall act as Chair and call meetings of the Committee.
b) Meetings of the Committee shall be closed to everyone other than members of the Committee and those invited to attend at the request of the Committee.

## III. 6 Research Committee

i. Membership
a) The Committee shall be composed of the Dean, the Associate Dean with responsibility for research in the Faculty, one representative from each sub-unit of the Faculty (chosen by the Chair of the Committee and the unit

Chair or Director), and such other members of Faculty as may be invited to participate by the Chair of the Committee.
ii. Mandate
a) The Research Committee considers issues relating to the promotion and conduct of research in the Faculty, and makes such recommendations as it considers appropriate.
b) The Committee reports to Faculty Board through the Chair of the Committee.
iii. Meetings
a) The Associate Dean acts as chair, and calls meetings of the Committee.

## III. 7 The FPA Computing Committee

i. Membership
a) The FPA Computing Committee shall consist of one representative from each of the Department of Economics, the Department of Law and Legal Studies, the Department of Political Science, the School of Public Policy and Administration, the Norman Paterson School of International Affairs, the School of Social Work, and the School of Journalism and Communication, together with the Faculty Computing Analyst.
ii. Mandate
a) The FPA Computing Committee considers issues relating to all aspects of academic computing, providing advice to both the Dean of the Faculty and to members of faculty across the University, and liaising with the Academic Computing Committee of the University.
b) The FPA Computing Committee reports to Faculty Board through the Chair of the Committee.
iii. Meetings
a) One of the members of the FPA Computing Committee who is also a member of Faculty shall be selected by the FPA Computing Committee to act as chair, and shall call meetings of the FPA Computing Committee as may be necessary.

## III. 8 Ad Hoc Committees

i. Faculty Board shall be entitled to establish such other standing or ad hoc committees as it sees fit, to determine the composition and terms of reference of such committees, and to appoint the initial members of such committees, provided that
a) no such committee shall remain a committee of Faculty Board for more than two years from the date of the meeting of Faculty Board at which it was established unless its composition and terms of reference are incorporated in this Constitution; and
b) all elections subsequently necessary to fill positions on such committees are held pursuant to the provisions of Clause V. 2 below

## III. 9 Ex Officio Members

i. Unless otherwise stated, ex officio members of the above Committees shall have full voting rights and responsibilities.

## IV <br> JOINT COMMITTEE ON ADMISSIONS AND STUDIES (JCAS)

## IV. 1 Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies (JCAS)

i. Membership

The Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies shall consist of:
a) four faculty members, two from the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (as defined in its Constitution) and two from the Faculty of Public Affairs nominated by the Executive Committee of the appropriate Faculty Boards, to serve a three-year term, renewable;
b) two alternate faculty members, one from each Faculty Board, nominated by the appropriate Faculty Board Executive Committees in the manner described in IV.1.i.a for a three-year period, who will be called upon to replace regular members who are unable to attend;
c) one Admissions Officer and one representative from the Registrar's Office as ex officio and non-voting members.
d) Terms of Office will normally commence July $1^{\text {st }}$.
ii. Officers
a) The Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies shall select a Chair from among its membership for a term of two years. The position of Chair shall alternate between the two Faculties.
b) The Admissions Officer representative shall maintain a record of all meetings and committee decisions
iii. Mandate

The Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies shall:
a) hear and decide petitions and appeals concerning the interpretation of, exceptions to, or administrative application of academic regulations affecting the admission and academic progress and graduation of students registered in undergraduate programs in either the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, the Faculty of Public Affairs, or both;
b) actively monitor the admission and academic regulationsspecific to undergraduate programs in either the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences, the Faculty of Public Affairs, or both, and make recommendations to the relevant Faculty Boards regarding regulatory change when needed;
c) prior to the start of each Fall term submit to both Faculty Boards a report on its activities covering the prior academic year.
iv. Meetings
a) The Joint Committee on Admissions and Studies shall meet as required to consider petitions in a timely fashion.
b) The Committee will decide its own quorum rule, but it is recommended that the quorum be the Chair and two faculty representatives.

## V <br> ELECTIONS

## V. 1 Election of Secretary and Clerk of Faculty Board

i. Except as otherwise provided for in valid University or Senate documents, the election of the Secretary and the Clerk of Faculty Board shall take place during April on a date (the "Election Date") assigned by the Executive Committee, and shall be conducted in accordance with the following procedures:
a) Not less than four weeks prior to the Election Date, the Executive Committee shall circulate to members of Faculty Board a call for nominations to be received in the office of the Clerk of Faculty Board not later than two weeks prior to the Election Date.
b) All nominations submitted pursuant to paragraph V.1.i(a) shall be signed by three faculty members of Faculty Board and the nominee.
c) The Secretary shall call a meeting of Faculty Board for the Election Date, and in issuing that call shall append a list of those nominated pursuant to paragraph V.1.i(a).
d) The Secretary and the Clerk shall be elected from among the nominees listed pursuant to paragraph V.1.i(c) by a simple majority of the votes cast at the meeting of Faculty Board referred to in that paragraph.
ii. The office of Secretary or Clerk (as the case may be) shall be deemed to be vacated should the incumbent be absent from the University for longer than six consecutive months.
iii. Should the office of Secretary or Clerk (as the case may be) become vacant for any reason whatsoever, then the remaining members of the Executive Committee shall appoint another faculty member of Faculty Board to serve in that office until a replacement is elected in accordance with the provisions of sub-Clause V.1.i. Such election shall be held in the April next following the creation of the vacancy.

## V. 2 Election of Members of Committees of Faculty Board

i. Except as otherwise provided for in valid University or Senate documents, wherever in this Constitution it is provided that members of committees of Faculty Board shall be elected, then such election shall take place during April at a meeting (the "Meeting") of Faculty Board, and shall be conducted in accordance with the following procedures:
a) Not less than four weeks prior to the Meeting, the Executive Committee shall circulate to members of Faculty Board a call for nominations to be received in the office of the Clerk of Faculty Board not later than two weeks prior to the Meeting.
b) All nominations submitted pursuant to paragraph V.2.i(a) shall be signed by one member of Faculty Board and the nominee.
c) With notice of the Meeting, the Executive Committee shall circulate a list of nominees to elected positions on committees of Faculty Board.
d) Elected members of committees of Faculty Board shall be elected from among the nominees listed pursuant to paragraph V.2.i(c) by a simple majority of the votes cast at the Meeting.
ii. Any elected member of a committee of Faculty Board shall be deemed to have vacated the position should the incumbent be absent from the University for longer than six consecutive months.
iii. Should a vacancy occur for any reason whatsoever in any elected position on a committee of Faculty Board, then the remaining members of that committee shall appoint another member to serve in that position until a replacement is
elected in accordance with the provisions of sub-Clause V.2.i. Such election shall be held in the April next following the creation of the vacancy.
iv. Except as otherwise indicated, all FPA student members of Faculty Board committees shall be elected or appointed by the appropriate official student government body - the Carleton Student Government Association (CASG) or Graduate Student Association (GSA) - as required, according to its own procedures.

## VI

BYLAWS AND CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

## VI. 1 Bylaws

Bylaws of Faculty Board shall be adopted by a simple majority of the votes cast at a duly constituted meeting of Faculty Board at which a quorum is present. Notice of proposed amendment, repeal or adoption of bylaws must be given in writing not less than 30 days prior to the meeting at which those proposals are intended to be considered.

## VI. 2 Constitutional Amendments

This Constitution may be adopted or amended by a vote of $2 / 3$ of the votes cast at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Faculty Board at which a quorum is present. Notice of proposed constitutional amendments must be given in writing not less than 30 days prior to the meeting at which those proposals are intended to be considered.

## Re: Report to Faculty Board on Behalf of Undergraduate Students

I want to thank you for taking the time to read my report on behalf of the undergraduate students. I only have two issues to report on for this meeting, a follow-up on the Syllabi Bank initiative and student concerns relating to the cost-of-living.

First as a follow-up to my report from the previous meeting, CASG is continuing to advocate for syllabi banks across departments. The concerns that were shared at the last FPA board meeting were brought back to FPA councillors as well as the CASG executive. This effort is still ongoing.

Second, through discussions with the FPA councillors as well as larger conversations at the CASG level it has become apparent that the current cost-of-living crisis is beginning to take a toll on students. At a FPA councillor meeting in early November, some councillors shared concerns over the increased workload students have taken on this school year due to the increase in the cost of rent and groceries among other things. It appears to FPA councillors that many students have taken on additional part-time or full-time jobs to pay for rent, education etc. It should be noted that this finding was through peer engagement and not a formal survey. As a result, FPA councillors expressed interest specifically related to scholarships and alleviating some of the financial stress put on students. Although I recognize that the cost-of-living crisis is one that is beyond the scope of the FPA Board, I felt that it was important to share the concerns of students on this issue as it may have greater effects across departments.

At the CASG level, talks have begun between councillors and the executive about the possibility of increasing the CASG student levy to create long lasting scholarships for future students. The possibility of this levy has only been proposed and at this time there has been no council vote on the matter.
