1. Welcome and Call to Order

David Mendeloff, Interim Chair, welcomed faculty members to Faculty Board and acknowledged that we were meeting on the traditional, unceded, unsundered territory of the Algonquin, Anishinaabeg people, and expressed gratitude to them as the traditional stewards of the land.

2. Adoption of Agenda

The agenda was approved by unanimous consent as circulated.

3. Adoption of Minutes of the April 15, 2024 Meeting

6. Report from Dean Brenda O'Neill

9. Faculty Board Constitution

David Mendeloff invited comments and collected feedback on the proposed revision to the Faculty Board constitution, to align with a new template that has been developed for all Faculty Boards across the University. The intent is to bring a revised document to Faculty Board at the next meeting in November.

He noted that he had received some feedback regarding the circulated draft prior to the meeting:

- First, it was noted that there should be some language requiring a mandatory review of the Constitution. This is not something that is required in the template, but is a good

practice. It was suggested that we add language that would require a mandatory review every five years. There were no objections to this suggestion.

- Second, several colleagues raised concerns about the voting rules and procedures (Clause IV.2(f).), particularly the proposed language around alternative voting methods. The default voting for regular business is by show of hands, but members can make a motion for a different method, as long as the voting is “open and transparent to all voting members at the meeting.” It was noted that this effectively prohibits any motion for a ballot vote (except for cases of elections). The chair noted that this language comes directly from the Senate Rules of Procedure, which is what the template encourages Faculties to follow. He acknowledged that in the Senate this voting rule makes sense, since that is a representative body where transparent voting is required to hold Senators accountable. However, Faculty Board is not a representative body: other than students, all faculty members are *ex officio* members of Faculty Board. So there is no compelling rationale for limiting ballot voting just to elections. It was suggested that the Clause should be revised to allow for ballot voting when the Faculty Board supports it. There was general support for this change.

B. Woo noted that the draft constitution is ambiguous with regard to the School of Journalism and Communication, which effectively has two Directors, not one. This creates some ambiguity with regard to representation on certain committees. The chair indicated that he would review the language and incorporate any changes that would clarify SJC representation.

There was no report from GSA.

10.3. Senate Report

There was no Senate Report. It was noted that a summary of highlights is posted after Senate meetings. Sean Burges spoke briefly about the most recent meeting.

Re: **Report of the Associate Dean (Research and Graduate)**

Tier 2 Canada Research Chair in Frontiers of Economic Analysis

The search committee received 35 applications for the Tier 2 CRC position in “Frontiers of Economics”. A shortlist of 3 candidates has been approved by the Dean and VP Research & International. Interviews are expected to be completed by the end of November. The committee hopes to submit a nomination to the Dean before the end of term.

FPGA Research Committee

The Research Committee met twice since the last meeting of Faculty Board. We are reviewing different practices and approaches for supporting and promoting faculty and graduate student research in FPGA. The committee is also undertaking a policy review of the Research Time Award program that provides course release for eligible faculty members who win substantial research grants. The program has been an important part of the faculty’s success in external research grants. The intention of the review is to ensure the program’s continued financial sustainability and that it will continue to advance the faculty’s strategic objective of empowering research.

Domestic Entrance Scholarships

Graduate Studies has announced it will no longer be awarding domestic entrance scholarships. These awards were valued at \$2,000 for domestic master’s and \$3,000 for domestic PhD students with a GPA of 10.5 and higher and were provided to students above and beyond the standard recruitment package of a TA + scholarship. This decision is a response to the university’s financial circumstances. All Ontario universities are facing the same challenges and exploring similar measures.

Thesis/Dissertation Examinations and IMS Support

Graduate Studies has announced a change to its practice of supporting hybrid and online thesis/dissertation examinations. The now defunct Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Affairs used to pay for the technical support at thesis and dissertation examination. Effective immediately, these services will no longer be provided by Graduate Studies. Production Services (IMS) will continue to offer technical support for units that need assistance; however, the cost of these services will have to be paid for by the requesting unit. Graduate Studies will continue to provide their boardroom (510 TB), which is equipped

with videoconferencing equipment, free of charge provided the defence is scheduled during regular business hours (Mon-Fri 8:30am-4:30pm). Units are encouraged to have their own staff provide technical assistance or they may contact Graduate Studies for a list of rates. These will vary depending on the technical needs of the unit.

Graduate Recruitment

Recruitment to our master's and PhD programs is underway. Some units have moved to a rolling admissions framework to respond to applications as they come in and issue offers earlier in the recruitment cycle. Other units have established an early and standard application window to be able to assess applications and make offers in batches. Enrolment targets have largely carried forward from the 2024-25 planning cycle; it is expected that the value of financial packages (separate from entrance scholarships_ will remain essentially the same for 2025-26, however we are hoping to provide units with more flexibility in terms of how those packages are built. This remains an ongoing planning priority as responsibility for graduate funding continues to move from Graduate Studies to the line faculties.

Katherine A.H. Graham Lecture on Indigenous Policy

On Monday November 4th the Faculty hosted the annual [Katherine A.H. Graham Lecture](#) on Indigenous Policy. This year's speaker was Abram Benedict, Regional Chief of Ontario for the Assembly of First Nations. Chief Benedict's lecture was titled "Transforming First Nations Child and Family Services." The lecture was hosted in partnership with the Carleton Centre for Community Innovation (3ci).

For the Public Good: Graduate program planning workshop

On Friday November 12th, the dean's office hosted a half-day workshop for chairs and directors, graduate supervisors, and graduate administrators, with the co-authors of *For the Public Good: Reimagining Graduate Arts Programs in Canadian Universities* (University of Alberta Press, 2024). The purpose of the workshop was to foster discussion and information sharing across units in the faculty around shared challenges, priorities, and opportunities for graduate program design and evaluation. These discussions will continue at the unit level in the coming months.

Recruitment

Undergraduate Recruitment

Fall has been very busy for undergraduate recruitment events. I wish to thank everyone for their consistent and enthusiastic participation. These events include our new FPGA Showcase, the Ontario Universities' Fair, and Undergraduate Recruitment's Fall Open House, held on October 26th. With respect to the latter, UGR has reported overall attendance for the event as follows:

Carleton Fall Open House Attendance:

UGR also reports that the Carleton delegation obtained almost 4,000 leads at the Ontario Universities' Fair in October:

I do not have a break down for either of these events for FPGA units. But my sense is that we are seeing consistent interest from prospective students.

Graduate Recruitment

We held an FGPA graduate program fair on Monday, November 18th in the Nideyinàn Galleria. (At the time of writing this had not yet occurred). Most FPGA graduate units were scheduled to participate and have faculty members/staff/students present throughout the day to interact with prospective students (mostly current Carleton undergraduates seeking to learn more about their options for graduate studies and "find their fit").

Carleton University Student Leadership Initiative (CUSLI)

As the Dean mentioned at the previous Faculty Board meeting, the President has tasked FPGA to develop a two-year pilot program to provide leadership training to students from across campus using donor funds. We are styling this the Carleton University Student Leadership Initiative (CUSLI, rhymes with muesli). Given a tight timeline, the Dean asked all other faculty deans to nominate upper-year undergraduate students who have either demonstrated leadership skills or who have shown clear leadership potential. These students will be invited to apply, and we will select a cohort of 25 or so students to participate in sessions which will be held on seven Saturday mornings throughout the winter. If the pilot is successful, then we hope to secure funds to expand the program in future years.

Senate Ad Hoc Committees: Academic Integrity, and Petitions and Appeals

Senate has recently struck two Ad Hoc Committees. I will be chairing the [Ad Hoc Committee on Petitions and Appeals](#), which is tasked with recommending to Senate with respect to the following:

- a Senate Policy on Petitions and Appeals
- any required changes to the Terms of Reference of the Senate Undergraduate Studies Committee (SUSC),
- any other actions, within the purview of Senate, that result from a review of the current approach to Petitions and Appeals and, in particular, actions required to respond to the recent restructuring of the former Faculty of Graduate and Postdoctoral Affairs.

I will also sit on the [Ad Hoc Committee for Academic Integrity](#), which will be chaired by Professor Don Russell from Engineering and which is tasked with recommending changes to the Academic Integrity Policy to Senate.

Professor Vicky McArthur and Professor Marc Hanvelt will represent FPGA on the Petitions and Appeals committee and the Academic Integrity committee respectively.

If you have any views about how these two areas are currently handled, or advice on changes that should be considered, I invite you to share them with me, or with either Professor McArthur or Professor Hanvelt.

Academic Consideration Policy

On November 12th the Registrar's Office circulated a memo to remind instructors about the practical operation of the University's Academic Consideration Policy for Students in Medical or Other Extenuating Circumstances.

I have attached the R.O's document at the end of this memo.

Conversation amongst Associate Deans across faculties suggests that there is inconsistency and confusion about how this policy is being implemented. Here are some key points:

- Instructors retain full discretion to grant or not to grant requests for academic consideration based on their assessment of course learning outcomes. However, the Policy requires that instructors “recognize self-declaration forms submitted by students in accordance with the policy’s principle of good faith.”
- Students must contact the instructor prior to submitting an Academic Consideration Form for Coursework (either short-term or long-term) to the Registrar’s Office. Of course, instructors may grant accommodation without requiring students to submit a form. However, instructors are not permitted to request medical documentation.
- The benefit of having students submit requests through the Registrar’s Office is that the R.O. may monitor trends across the university, and may also be able to flag if the same student is making multiple requests for consideration. If mental health is mentioned as a reason for the request(s), the R.O. may refer the student to other resources, including filing a care report as appropriate.

If you have any thoughts on the operation of the policy or the manner/ frequency with which students are using it, I would be interested in hearing about your experience.

Academic Consideration for Coursework: Updated Information for Instructors (Circulated by Registrar's Office on November 12, 2024)

The Registrar's Office would like to provide an important update to instructors with regards to the [Academic Consideration Policy](#). As per the [Policy](#), coursework is defined as all academic deliverables, excluding formally scheduled undergraduate final exams and take home exams. Students are advised to consult the course syllabus about the instructor's policy or procedures for requesting Academic Consideration. Students are to speak with their instructor before submitting an online request Academic Consideration for Coursework Form.

The decision to approve or deny a request, and the determination of the appropriate accommodation(s), remains the discretion of the instructor. The decision is to be communicated to the student by the instructor.

As a reminder, requests for Academic Consideration can be:

- **Short term:** Circumstances lasting 5 days or less and requiring no supporting documentation
 - Instructors may, if appropriate, require the student to submit a [Academic Consideration for Coursework Form](#), or may approve/deny the request informally.
- **Long term:** Circumstances lasting more than 5 days and requiring supporting documentation
 - Instructors may require the student to submit a [Long Term Academic Consideration for Coursework Form](#) with supporting documentation, or may approve/deny the request informally.

When a request form is received by the Registrar's Office, it will be sent to the instructor within 1 business day. When supporting documentation is required, there may be a delay in the form being sent to the instructor. More information for students and faculty can be found on the [Academic Consideration Main page](#).

In instances where the student cites mental health as the reason for the request, the Registrar's Office will send the student information about available resources to assist them and where necessary complete a Care Report. Instructors shall be informed if a Care Report has been submitted.

The RO is currently tracking requests that are being submitted by students, where necessary, students are being referred to appropriate resources.

Note: The Registrar's Office continues to facilitate the process for Undergraduate students that require accommodations for formally scheduled final and take-home exams through the [Deferral application process](#).

- The [self declaration PDF form](#) is only for the formal exam deferral process. As of the 2024 December formal exam period, the self declaration form will be integrated into the formal exam deferral form and will no longer be in use.

UNDERGRADUATE & GRADUATE CURRICULUM

I chair the both the FPGA **Undergraduate Curriculum Committee** and the **Graduate Curriculum Committee**. Both committees have each met five times so far this term to review and course and program change proposals from units across the Faculty. The proposals reviewed since the last Faculty Board meeting are presented in separate reports to Faculty Board. Tables 1 and 2 present summaries of the proposals the UGCC and GCC have considered, which clearly demonstrates the intensity of effort and high level of commitment staff and faculty in each unit have put into reviewing their programs. I also participated in the FPGA workshop on Reimagining Graduate Programs on November 8. I have had several meetings with units regarding potential and planned program modifications for 2026-27 and beyond.

At meetings of the **Undergraduate Affairs Committee**, the issue of Academic Considerations was discussed, and the RO has circulated a memo to all units to clarify the process for dealing with formal and informal consideration requests.

I have attended several meetings of the **Graduate Affairs Committee** where discussion of graduate recruitment and graduate funding continue. To support these discussions, I have been working on identifying and forecasting FPGA's enrolment-based TA needs to support the Faculty's teaching mission.

Since the last Faculty Board, I have attended two meetings of **SCCASP** as FPGA's representative. SCCASP has approved all the major and minor modifications recommended by FPGA Faculty Board on October 7, 2024. A memo outlining the process for implementation of the **new program element definitions** has been circulated to all units by the RO. This was also discussed by the UGCC.

OTHER ITEMS

A revised course outline template will be circulated on November 15, with information related to costing course materials and other updates. The template will be posted on the FPGA Intranet with the [Teaching Regulations and Procedures](#). Please consult this site regularly for updates and news.

Subject: **November 2024 Report**

I have 3 items to report.

1. Student EDI Research Award

The Dean's Office has launched FPGA Student EDI Research Award for one undergraduate student and one graduate student. This annual award is to recognize the importance of, and to encourage student research in, EDI and reconciliation-related topics as reflected in the Faculty's strategic plan, Lead. Connect. Transform. The application deadline for the inaugural award is November 29th, 2024. Please refer to the award announcement for details here, <https://carleton.ca/fpga/2024/fpga-announces-new-student-edi-research-award/>, and encourage students doing research in these areas to apply.

2. CU-CUASA EDI Research and Teaching Innovation Award

The CU-CUASA Special Fund for EDI Research and Pedagogical Innovation supports and enhances research excellence and pedagogical innovation across the institution undertaken by members of equity-seeking groups and/or on topics that hold equity, diversity and inclusion considerations as a dominant focus. The Provost's office received 4 applications from FPGA.

3. FPGA BIPOC Student Mentorship Program

The mentorship program provides opportunities for racialized and Indigenous graduate students studying in the various academic departments housed within Carleton University's Faculty of Public and Global Affairs (FPGA) to learn from and engage with federal public servants. The program is voluntary for both mentors and students.

Mentors are recruited by the participating federal departments. Mentees are recruited by Avey Purohit and Saul Schwartz, working with FPGA program supervisors and with student societies. Potential mentees are asked to fill out a short application form asking them to report their gender and ethnic background. There is no deadline for application. After being matched, mentors and mentees receive a common email introducing them to each other and asking that they organize an initial meeting. A week after the introductory email is sent, the organizers follow-up with an email asking the mentees if an initial meeting had been set up. No further contact is initiated by the organizers until the end of the academic year when we ask mentees and mentors to fill out a short evaluation form. The mentor-mentee relationship is informal and can continue indefinitely if the mentor and mentee wish.

Mentorship relationships provide opportunities and guidance that are particularly important for students who identify as racialized or Indigenous. While FPGA students are learning valuable skills, the steps to making the transition from a degree to a public service career are not always clear. Given longstanding systemic inequities

in the federal public service and the public sector, racialized students may not have equitable access to the informal networks and information often required for a successful public service career.

The mentees can meet regularly with their mentors to learn, ask questions, understand career options, and share lived experiences. Mentors will sharpen their managerial and mentorship skills, and support the next generation of prospective federal public servants. Through establishing meaningful relationships between federal public servants and FPGA students, the program further aims to establish informal recruitment pathways for racialized and Indigenous students at Carleton University.

Faculty governance and leadership appointments

The search for a new Director of Kroeger College, which has been vacant since mid-August, is still ongoing. I continue to serve as Interim College Director until an appointment is made. As I noted last month, **if you have an interest in taking on the Kroeger Director position and would like to learn more, please reach out to the Dean or me and we will be happy to discuss.** In addition to SJC and Kroeger College, the Dean will be soon be announcing processes for the appointment and/or reappointment of Directors beginning July 2025 in: the Institute of Criminology and Criminal Justice, School of Journalism and Communication (both Co-Directors), and the School of Social Work.

Staffing and space review

I continue to work with the Dean and Kristi Wells, Manager (Administration and Operations) to review administrative support and use of space in FPGA units. A spreadsheet detailing “administrative demand” in our programs and the current levels of administrative support (both professional staff and academic administration) has now been shared with Chairs and Directors and Departmental Administrators. We have also started walk-throughs of space in individual units to help understand how space is being used. As noted in my report last month, our goal with both exercises is to gain a better understanding of staffing support and space use, and to identify where there might be opportunities for achieving efficiencies in how these resources are utilized.

Senate committees

I currently represent the Faculty on two Senate standing committees: The Senate Quality Assurance and Planning Committee (SQAPC) and the Senate Academic Governance Committee (SAGC). SAGC has begun reviewing Faculty Board constitutions, starting with Sprott and FASS. In light of the discussions at the most recent meeting, I have decided to pull the PGA Faculty Board constitution from our November agenda and to provide the most recent draft to SAGC for their comments. I anticipate bringing the constitution, reflecting any changes suggested by SAGC, to our next Faculty Board meeting in the Winter term.

The UGCC has held six meetings so far this term, including three since the October Faculty Board, to review proposed undergraduate curricular changes. The UGCC is presenting 133 program and course change proposals for Faculty Board approval and recommendation to Senate. A summary of the proposed modifications is attached. Details of proposed modifications can be found in the [UGCC meeting binders](#) on the [FPGA Intranet](#). (The 'date reviewed' column in the attached summary table corresponds to the associated meeting binder.)

There are 25 proposed **Track B major modifications**, as follow:

1. The deletion of eight programs in the Bachelor of Global and International Studies, following a request from the Deans of FASS and FPGA to review programs with low student enrolments. The proposed deletions for the 2026-27 Calendar are:
 - 1.1. BGInS Specialization **[BGISH-36D]** and Stream **[BGISG-37D]** in Global Literatures
 - 1.2. BGInS Specialization **[BGISH-36L1]** and Stream **[BGISG-37L1]** in Global Migration and Transnationalism
 - 1.3. BGInS Specialization **[BGISH-36T]** and Stream **[BGISG-37T]** in Teaching English in Global Contexts
 - 1.4. BGInS Specialization **[BGISH-36U]** and Stream **[BGISG-37U]** in French and Francophone Studies
2. Modifications to Global Politics Specialization **[BGISH-36E]** and Stream **[BGISG-37E]** in the Bachelor of Global and International Studies for the 2025-26 Calendar. The proposed changes are to replace program-specific courses (GPOL) with comparable Political Science (PSCI) courses to enable more efficient program delivery. A new Capstone Seminar in Global Politics **[PSCI 4699]** is proposed, exclusively for students in this program.
3. A change in the grade mode to GINS international internships in the Bachelor of Global and International Studies from a letter grade to SAT/UNS, which is consistent with the practice in most placement courses. This requires deletion of two current courses **[GINS 3900, GINS 3901]** and creation of two new courses **[GINS 3910, GINS 3911]** to replace them, for the 2025-26 Calendar.
4. The deletion of the Minor in Industrial Economics **[M41]** for the 2026-27 Calendar due to low student enrolment and interest.
5. The deletion of the Bachelor of Economics Concentration in International Political Economy **[3DE]** and the Concentration in Natural Resources, Environment, and Economy **[3DJ]** due to low student interest and enrolments, effective for the 2026-27 Calendar.
6. The renaming and restructuring of the Bachelor of Economics Concentration in Advanced Economic Analysis **[3DC]** to enable greater flexibility and choice for students enrolled in the program, effective for the 2025-26 Calendar.

7. The modification of the Bachelor of Economics Honours programs to reflect a change in course sequencing to distribute coursework load more evenly between years and reduce bottlenecks for students. This involves replacing old course names and codes with new ones in the following programs, effective for the 2025-26 Calendar:
 - 7.1. Bachelor of Economics Combined Honours **[BECOH-41+]**
 - 7.2. Bachelor of Economics Honours with Concentration **[BECOH-CONC]**
 - 7.3. Bachelor of Economics Honours with Concentrations **[BECOH-CONCS]**
 - 7.4. Bachelor of Economics Honours **[BECOH-UECO]**
8. The new Certificate in Journalism in Indigenous Communities **[TBD-2286]** and its associated Internship course **[JOUR 1107]**. This new program was approved by Senate in October 2024. The proposed modifications enter the new program into the 2025-26 Calendar.

The FPGA GCC has held five meetings and considered 118 proposed graduate curricular changes so far this term. Of these, two meetings (Oct 16, Nov 13) have occurred since the last meeting of FPGA Faculty Board on October 7, and the GCC has reviewed 60 modification proposals.

The GCC is presenting these 60 modification proposals for Faculty Board's approval and recommendation to Senate. A summary list of the proposed modifications is attached, and details of each can be found in the [GCC meeting binders](#) on the [FPGA Intranet site](#). (The 'date reviewed' column in the attached summary table corresponds to the associated meeting binder.)

There are four **Track B major modifications** proposed, as follow:

1. **Graduate Diploma in European, Russian, and Eurasian Studies [GDIP: EURUS]:** The Institute of European and Russian Studies is proposing to rename and restructure the Graduate Diploma to expand the focus of the program to include the Eurasian region. The name of the Diploma and program requirements are being revised to reflect this expanded focus.
2. **Deletion of INAF 6907: Doctoral Research Prospectus Defence [INAF 6907]:** The Norman Paterson School of International Affairs is proposing the deletion of this credit course and replacing it with a non-credit mandatory Doctoral Research Seminar (INAF 6005, approved by Faculty Board in October).
3. **Restructuring of the PhD in International Affairs with Collaborative Specialization in African Studies [PHD-43AS]:** The Norman Paterson School of International Affairs and the Institute of African Studies are proposing revisions to this program that are collateral to restructuring of the PhD in International Affairs, including the elimination of comprehensive examinations, revised credit and coursework requirements.
4. **Deletion of INAF 5919: MA/JD Thesis [INAF 5959]:** The Norman Paterson School of International Affairs is proposing the deletion of the thesis pathway from the joint MA/JD program with the University of Ottawa. There is no student interest in this pathway, and it is very difficult for students to meet the requirements.

Motion to approve Major Modifications for the 2025-26 Graduate Calendar:

THAT FPGA Faculty Board recommends that Senate approve the proposed **Major Modifications** in the attached list for the 2025-26 Graduate Calendar.

There are 56 **Minor Modifications** presented to Faculty Board for recommendation to Senate for approval. These are all course modifications, including the deletion of 40 courses, the creation of 2 new courses, and updates to 16 existing courses.

Graduate Students' Association Report – November 2024

1. Grants and Awards

This fall semester, we are awarding grants to over 200 students to address financial challenges, academic needs, and accessibility support.

2. Food Hamper Program

Partnering with CUSA, we distribute monthly food hampers to over 400 graduate students, addressing food insecurity. Surveys are underway to evaluate and improve the program.

3. Events and Community Engagement

Supported cultural and social events like Diwali and Halloween to foster inclusivity and community among graduate students.

4. GSA Lounge Operations

Enhanced the GSA Lounge with free coffee and tea. Mike's Place Pub now operates two days a week, providing a welcoming space for students.

5. Job Hiring and Student Support

Initiated hiring for key positions to expand our services, including roles in Peer Support Coordinator, Sexual Assault Outreach Coordinator (SAOC), Office Assistant (OA), and Outreach Coordinator, with interviews underway to enhance student services.

6. Referendum and Strategic Planning

Ongoing discussions about the Mike's Place referendum and preparations for future strategic planning to improve GSA services.

7. Health and Accessibility Support

The GSA continues to assist graduate students with health insurance inquiries, and accessibility grants to support graduate student success.

8. Academic Advocacy and Support

Addressed individual student concerns related to academic accommodations, deregistration issues, grade appeals, health-related challenges, visa delays, course withdrawal requests, and financial aid inquiries, ensuring their cases were directed to appropriate university offices or resolved through GSA advocacy.

Advocated for graduate students' academic rights, including addressing concerns about tuition-related communications, lack of funding support, and policies impacting student well-being.
