II. Preclusions:

Level prerequisite

- Placement test: Students who haven't registered for French classes at Carleton before need to take a placement test: https://edc.carleton.ca/french_placement/ before registering for the class
- Prerequisite: One FREN course of 2000-level or above
- Conditions: Francophone or too advanced students will not be permitted to take this course. Students cannot go backwards in a sequence of levels in language courses.

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V. Other requirements

Language requirement

- French is the language of instruction and communication in the class.

Attendance requirement

- Students must attend a **minimum of 80%** of the classes. If a student fail to comply with this requirement will get **0 out of 5%** for attendance and participation grade. The professor will not repeat the course or part of the course in class, online, over the phone or by email.

Assignments and Tests

PLAGIARISM

 assignment;

- using another's data or research findings without appropriate acknowledgement;
- submitting a computer program developed in whole or in part by someone else, with or without modifications, as one's own; and
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's work and/or failing to use quotations marks.

Plagiarism is a serious offence that cannot be resolved directly by the course's instructor. The Associate Dean of the Faculty conducts a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course.
