#### GEOM4003 – REMOTE SENSING OF THE ENVIRONMENT

**Prerequisite:** Geomatics 3002

Objectives: To develop skills and understanding of quantitative methods of remote sensing image

data acquisition and analysis. To explore the use of remotely sensed information in a

variety of applications.

Topics: Advanced image enhancement; land cover classification for thematic mapping;

biophysical modeling; applications in resources, environment, and urban mapping. The focus of this course will be on analyzing environmental conditions and phenomenon using remotely-sensed imagery through spatial and statistical analysis. This course will use Google Earth Engine, a cloud based remote sensing progressing suite. Students will require access to the internet through a modern browser and a google account (i.e., Gmail, Google Drive). No coding skills are required but students will be expected to

use and develop their own python scripts in the labs

Final Exam:

A two-hour short-answer examination will be scheduled in the Final Examination period. Exam will be a combination of multiple choice, short answer, and long answer (synthesis) questions. No aids except calculator required.

Labs:

All assignments must be submitted through Brightspace by the due date and time. The penalty for late labs is 10% per day unless accompanied by appropriate documentation, such as a medical certificate. Late labs will not be accepted more than two (2) days after their deadline. In the case of illness, you must make arrangements with the course instructor prior to the due date/time. In place of a doctor's note or medical certificate, students are advised to complete the self-declaration form available on the Registrar's Office website to request academic accommodation for missed coursework including exams and assignments.

A rigorous investigation is conducted by the Office of the Faculty Dean, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial.
