I. Course description: This course focuses on quantitative methods for geographers using R - a popular, open-source statistical software and programming environment. Topics include data management, descriptive statistics, hypothesis testing, linear regression and correlation, multiple regression, principal component analysis, cluster analysis, descriptive spatial statistics and introductory geostatistics. A strong emphasis is placed on understanding and interpreting these statistical analyses and their results in relation to real-world questions, with a focus on geographically varying phenomena such as climate, pollution and socio-economic and demographic indicators of health and well-being. Students will acquire new skills in data-management, statistical analysis and scripting using a powerful (and freely available), command-line statistics and graphing environment. The course does not require any previous computer programming experience or major expertise in math, but an interest in problem-solving and computer-based learning is a must.

- c. Permissibility of the use of generative artificial intelligence tools (e.g. ChatGPT) as per Section 7 above
- d. The University Academic Integrity Policy defines plagiarism as “*presenting, whether intentionally or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one’s own.*” This includes reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else’s published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one’s own without proper citation or reference to the original source. Examples of sources from which the ideas, expressions of ideas or works of others may be drawn from include but are not limited to: books, articles, papers, literary compositions and phrases, performance compositions, chemical compounds, artworks, laboratory reports, research results, calculations and the results of calculations, diagrams, constructions, computer reports, computer code/software, material on the internet and/or conversations.

Examples of plagiarism include, but are not limited to:

- any submission prepared in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, paraphrased material, algorithms, formulae, scientific or mathematical concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another’s data or research findings without appropriate acknowledgement;
- submitting a computer program developed in whole or in part by someone else, with or without modifications, as one’s own; and
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another’s work and/or failing to use quotations marks.

Plagiarism is a serious offence that cannot be resolved directly by the course’s instructor. The Associate Dean of the Faculty conducts a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of “F” for the course.
