CLCV 1002 A: SURVEY OF GREEK CIVILIZATION

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This course provides an introduction to the study of Greek antiquity, the discipline of Classics and its methodologies. The culture and society will be set in historical context and studied through readings from representative ancient authors (in English translation) and through the art and architecture of the period.

Readings:

Optional text: David Sansone, *Ancient Greek Civilization*. 3rd ed. (Wiley-Blackwell, 2017) Available in <u>full text online</u> through Carleton's MacOdrum library.

Required readings: Students will be <u>required</u> to read some primary sources (ie. literature written by ancient authors). There are 10 readings in total: all are translated into English and all can be read in a couple hours.

Homer's Iliad Books 1, 23 and 24 Herodotus' Histories 7.175-238 – the Battle of Thermopylae Homer's Odyssey Books 9 and 11 Euripides' Bacchae Sophocles' Oedipus Tyrannos (aka Oedipus Rex and Oedipus the King) Plato's Apology Aristophanes' Lysistrata

All primary source readings are posted on cuLearn. These and other translations can be found online or in hard copy in most libraries. I don't mind whose translation you use, but vocabulary, accuracy, and spelling can vary.

A make-up test is only offered for valid, documented reasons. The professor must be informed of such cases <u>immediately</u>. A make-up test is normally scheduled within one week of the original test and at the <u>professor's</u> convenience. It is only offered <u>once</u>. If you miss a final exam, you must contact the Registrar, not your professor.
