Course Description

This course will examine Greek and Roman dramatic genres, such as tragedy, the satyr play, and comedy. In addition to learning about the conventions of ancient theatre, students will read works of Aeschylus, Sophocles, Euripides, Aristophanes, Plautus, and Terence. Themes include love and hate, abandonment and betrayal, justice and revenge, the human condition and the gods. Throughout the course we will consider historical and cultural context, as well as literary imitation.

Required Texts

Aeschylus II: *The Oresteia*, *Proteus* (University of Chicago Press) Sophocles I: *Antigone*, *Oedipus the King* (University of Chicago Press) Euripides I: *Medea*, *Hippolytus* (University of Chicago Press) Euripides V: *The Bacchae*, *The Cyclops* (University of Chicago Press)

Aristophanes: *The Wasps, The Poet and the Women, The Frogs*, trans. D. Barrett Plautus & Terence: *Five Comedies*, trans. D. Berg and D. Parker

Evaluation

- 10% Class participation
- 15% Jan 23 short essay (600-800 words, or 2-3 pages) on the imagery of the Agamemnon
- 15% Feb 4 quiz on the entire trilogy (the *Oresteia*)
- 30% March 18 Major essay (1500-2000 words) comparing two or more tragedies

Deferred Term Work

In some situations, students are unable to complete term work because of illness or other circumstances beyond their control, which forces them to delay submission of the work.

Deferred Final Exams

Students who are unable to write a final examination because of a serious illness/emergency or other circumstances beyond their control may apply for accommodation. Normally, the accommodation for a missed final examination will be granting the student the opportunity to write a deferred examination. In specific cases when it is not possible to offer a deferred examination, and with the approval of the Dean, an alternate accommodation may be made. More information.

The application for a <u>deferral</u> must:

- be made in writing or online to the Registrar's Office no later than three working days after the original final examination or the due date of the take-home examination; and,
- 2. be fully supported by appropriate documentation and, in cases of illness, by a medical certificate dated no later than one working day after the examination, or by appropriate documents in other cases. Medical documents must specify the date of the onset of the illness, the (expected) date of recovery, and the extent to which the student was/is incapacitated during the time of the examination. The University's preferred medical form can be found at the Registrar's Office forms and fees page.
