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The art, architecture and archaeology of ancient Greece. Vase painting, sculpture, architecture, town planning and analogous arts.

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**Required Text:** J.G. Pedley, *Greek Art and Archaeology*, 5<sup>th</sup> ed. (Prentice-Hall, 2012).

The final date for voluntary withdrawal without academic penalty is **December 6, 2019**.

**Research Project:** A list of topics is posted on cuLearn: sign up (deadline Sept.26) by emailing the prof or signing the sheet in class. Projects by students who have not signed up for a topic by the deadline will not be graded.

The project asks you to find good quality sources (including images), document them correctly, create an annotated bibliography, and write a brief summary about a controversial topic in Greek art history. Students will submit each part of the project through cuLearn, where complete instructions are posted. Feedback and a grade will be provided for each part of the project (so students have a sense of how they are doing). However, all 3 parts of the research project must be submitted before a grade will count towards your final mark in the class. So if you do not submit one part of the project, you will receive a grade of zero for the entire project (ie. 0 out of 30% of your final grade in the course).

**Late policy:** Unless you have been granted an extension by the professor, the late penalty will be 10% subtracted from your grade for each day the project is late. The penalty will be applied only to the part of the project that is late.

**Tests:** The midterm test and final exam will include short answer, slide identification and essay questions. No aids are allowed on any test or exam. **Make-up tests** are only given for valid, documented reasons. The professor must be informed *immediately*, since a make-up test is normally scheduled within one week of the original test and at the professor's convenience. A make-up test is only offered once.

**Academic offences:** All students are expected to know what constitutes an academic offence, to avoid committing academic offences, and to take responsibility for their academic actions. Academic offences include things like plagiarism, cheating, obstructing academic activity, double submission, unauthorized collaboration, impersonation, falsification etc. Disciplinary penalties are imposed by the Associate Dean in accordance with the regulations of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.

**The penalty for a first offence is often a mark of *zero* for the work affected. Stiffer penalties may be imposed, and are normal for repeat offenders.**

All term work will be returned to students. Beyond that all grades will only be released through cuLearn. I am required to keep your final exam for 1 full year.
