**Course Overview**

This course examines classical mythology from multiple perspectives, beginning with a solid foundation in the Homeric poems as a central point of reference. Beyond the contents of the myths, we will look at the roles myth plays in (mostly) Greek culture, including literature, religion, politics, and the construction of identity. We will also think about the way myth works from a comparative perspective, using contemporary theoretical and cultural references.

**Notes**

- Regular attendance is essential. Regular attendance includes the assumption that you come prepared to class and be actively engaged during class. Readings are to be done before the class for which they are assigned.
- Quizzes will be online and open book/notes. They will be designed so that students who have done the readings and come to lectures will be able to recall or look up the necessary information in the time allowed.
- The midterm will be in class and consist of two parts. The first part is multiple choice and features questions like the quizzes. The second part will require a written response of around one side of writing (~400 words).
- There will be a choice for the final. You may either take a scheduled online exam that focuses more on the content of the course (like the quizzes and multiple choice part of the midterm; cumulative), or you may choose to re-write a story in the style of one of the authors studied, along with an analysis

and explanation of how your re-writing is like the author you are imitating. We will discuss this more during the course.

## Deferred Final Exams

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Students who are unable to write a final examination because of a serious illness/emergency or other circumstances beyond their control may apply for accommodation. The application for a [deferral](#) must:

1. be made in writing or online to the Registrar's Office no later than **three working days** after the original final examination or the due date of the take-home examination; and,
2. be fully supported by appropriate documentation and, in cases of illness, by a medical certificate dated no later than one working day after the examination, or by appropriate documents in other cases. Medical documents must specify the date of the onset of the illness, the (expected) date of recovery, and the extent to which the student was/is incapacitated during the time of the examination.
