Calendar Blurb:

Study of a period or theme in the art and archaeology of Ancient Greece. This course is repeatable for credit when the topic changes.

Winter 2021: This course will focus on the three cultures in Greece during the Bronze Age: Cycladic, Minoan, and Mycenaean civilizations. Archaeological evidence and some written records will be used to reconstruct the earliest history and beliefs of the Aegean, and as background to later Greek culture. We will discuss architecture, pottery, painting, and other evidence to reconstruct these societies and their beliefs.

According to Carleton, **asynchronous format** refers to an online course in which "the instructor and students share information, ideas, and learning experiences in a virtual course space. Asynchronous courses do not have live, scheduled meetings online. However, students are expected to remain up to date with the deadlines and due dates provided by the instructor. These courses require high-speed Internet access and a computer."

- 1. Get your topic approved by the professor by **Jan.29**
- 2. Watch "What is plagiarism?" and write your response_____pass / fail You must pass this before I will grade parts 3 and 4.
- 3. Annotated Research bibliography due **Feb.28** 20%
- 4. research essay due Mar. 28 40%

Final take-home Exam (all essay, due Apr. 27) 40%

The final date for voluntary withdrawal without academic penalty is April 14, 2021.

Deadlines: will be 11:59pm on the date due. All requirements will be submitted online through cuLearn.

A <u>late penalty</u> of minus 10% begins immediately once the deadline has passed and will increase by 10% for each day late up to a maximum of 5 days (minus 50%). After 5 days, I do not accept late work.

You can request an extension, but this should be arranged <u>before</u> the original deadline. When you request an extension, let me know how long you think you will need.

Description of requirements (see cuLearn for full details)

ALL work that you submit for grading in this course must be <u>your own work and yours alone</u>. Collaboration is not part of <u>any</u> of these requirements, and all borrowed words and ideas must be properly acknowledged (failure to do so is plagiarism).

Research Project: 4 required parts

- 1. Get your topic <u>approved by the prof</u> by **Jan.29**
 - o develop your topic in consultation with the professor.
 - Work on a topic that has NOT been approved will not be accepted or graded.
- 2. Watch the video (on cuLearn) "What is plagiarism?" and submit your 250-word answer
 - o Parts 3 and 4 of your research project will not be graded until you have passed.
- 3. Annotated research bibliography (instructions on cuLearn)
- 4. Research essay (instructions on cuLearn)

Take-home Final Exam

- The exam will be essay format. You will be asked to answer 2 or 3 broad questions about content from the entire course. Responses should be based on material from lectures and the textbook.
- The exam is NOT a research essay, so references are not required, <u>BUT</u> if you base <u>any</u> of your responses closely on any published source, you <u>must</u> properly cite that source (as in a research essay).
- The exam <u>will be posted</u> as an Announcement on cuLearn (and thus emailed to all registered students) by Apr. 14th and will be due **Apr. 27**.

Academic offences and the code of student conduct:

The code requires that all students <u>inform themselves</u> about what constitutes an **academic offence**, avoid committing academic offences, and take responsibility for their academic actions. Academic offences include things like plagiarism, cheating, improper research, obstructing academic activity, double submission, unauthorized cooperation / collaboration, impersonation, falsification etc. When the commission of an academic

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offence is established, penalties are imposed in accordance with the regulations of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences.

The <u>normal</u> penalty for a first offence is either a <u>mark of zero</u> for the affected work or <u>failure in the course</u>. Stiffer penalties apply for subsequent offences.

"Offences of conduct" refer to the <u>requirement</u> that all faculty, staff, and students interact with courtesy and honesty in any activities related to the university. This applies not only to academic debate but also broadly to behaviour and interaction between members of the Carleton community. For our course, it means that offensive or aggressive comments in any forum for members of the course will not be tolerated.

Offences of conduct are handled in the same way as Academic offences. They are reported to the office of the Dean of FASS and settled by the Associate Dean.

If you need help in learning how to avoid academic offences or offences of conduct, or clarification of aspects of the discipline policy, ask the professor.

Always retain for yourself a copy of all essays, term papers, written assignments or take-home tests submitted in your courses.

Academic Integrity at Carleton

The University Senate defines **plagiarism** as "presenting, whether intentionally or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own." This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another's data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without

prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs." Plagiarism is a serious offence that cannot be resolved directly by the course's instructor. The Associate Dean of the Faculty conducts a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course

This means that grades submitted by the instructor may be subject to revision. No grades are final until they have been approved by the Dean."

7 Student Rights and Responsibilities

Deferred Term Work

In some situations, students are unable to complete term work because of illness or other circumstances beyond their control, which forces them to delay submission of the work.

- 1. Students who claim illness, injury or other extraordinary circumstances beyond their control as a reason for missed term work are held responsible for immediately informing the instructor concerned and for making alternate arrangements with the instructor and in all cases this must occur no later than three (3.0) working days after the term work was due. The alternate arrangement must be made before the last day of classes in the term as published in the academic schedule. Normally, any deferred term work will be completed by the last day of term. In all cases, formative evaluations providing feedback to the student should be replaced with formative evaluations. In the event the altered due date must extend beyond the last day of classes in the term, the instructor will assign a grade of zero for the work not submitted and submit the student's earned grade accordingly; the instructor may submit a change of grade at a later date. Term work cannot be deferred by the Registrar.
- 2. In cases where a student is not able to complete term work due to illness or injury for a significant period of time/or long term, the instructor and/or student may elect to consult with the Registrar's Office (undergraduate courses) or Graduate Registrar (graduate courses) to determine appropriate action.

Deferred Final Exams

Students who are unable to write a final examination because of a serious illness/emergency or other circumstances beyond their control may apply for accommodation. Normally, the accommodation for a missed final examination will be granting the student the opportunity to write a deferred examination. In specific cases when it is not possible to offer a deferred examination, and with the approval of the Dean, an alternate accommodation may be made.

The application for a deferral must:

- 1. be made in writing to the Registrar's Office no later than three working days after the original final examination or the due date of the take-home examination; and,
- 2. be fully supported by appropriate documentation and, in cases of illness, by a medical certificate dated no later than one working day after the examination, or by appropriate documents in other cases. Medical documents must specify the date of the onset of the illness, the (expected) date of recovery, and the extent to which the student was/is incapacitated during the time of the examination.

Financial vs. Academic Withdrawal

Withdrawn. No academic credit, no impact on the CGPA. WDN is a permanent notation that appears on the official transcript for students who withdraw after the full fee adjustment date in each term (noted in the Academic Year section of the Calendar each term). Students may withdraw on or before the last day of classes.

Making registration decisions in Carleton Central involves making a financial and academic commitment for the courses you choose, regardless of attendance.
