A course for beginners in ancient Greek, designed to give students a grasp of basic grammatical forms and vocabulary (with reference to English derivatives) through the reading of continuous Greek

Lectures and practice periods four hours a week.

Course material:

- We cover the first 12 chapters of the textbook this term.
- This is a fast-paced course that requires students to stay on top of material week by week. Expect to do some work for this course <u>every</u> day: material is best learned in short, but regular study sessions. You will not absorb all the information if you try to cram with a single long study session.
- Every student will be expected to be present and to contribute to each class. Students who do not attend classes or participate are unable to keep up with the pace of the course and fail or do not perform well.
- Supplementary material (corrections to the text, practice forms for vocab quizzes, grammatical explanations) may be supplied to students throughout the term.
- The format of tests in this class will be explained in detail beforehand.

Make-up tests will only be given for valid, documented reasons. The professor must be informed of such cases *immediately*. Make-up tests are normally written within one week of the original test and at the convenience of the <u>professor</u>.

Academic offences: All students are expected to know what constitutes an academic offence, to avoid committing academic offences, and to take responsibility for their academic actions. Academic offenses include things like plagiarism, cheating, improper research, obstructing academic activity, double submission, unauthorized collaboration, impersonation, falsification etc. When an offence is committed,

COPIES OF WRITTEN WORK SUBMITTED

Always retain for yourself a copy of all essays, term papers, written assignments or take-home tests submitted in your courses.

PLAGIARISM

The University Senate defines plagiarism as "presenting, whether intentional or not, the ideas, expression of ideas or work of others as one's own." This can include:

- reproducing or paraphrasing portions of someone else's published or unpublished material, regardless of the source, and presenting these as one's own without proper citation or reference to the original source;
- submitting a take-home examination, essay, laboratory report or other assignment written, in whole or in part, by someone else;
- using ideas or direct, verbatim quotations, or paraphrased material, concepts, or ideas without appropriate acknowledgment in any academic assignment;
- using another's data or research findings;
- failing to acknowledge sources through the use of proper citations when using another's works and/or failing to use quotation marks;
- handing in "substantially the same piece of work for academic credit more than once without prior written permission of the course instructor in which the submission occurs."

Plagiarism is a serious offence which cannot be resolved directly with the course's instructor. The Associate Deans of the Faculty conduct a rigorous investigation, including an interview with the student, when an instructor suspects a piece of work has been plagiarized. Penalties are not trivial. They can include a final grade of "F" for the course
